

## "THINGS ARE LOOKING UP!"

While we had to endure some late April snow, for the most part it's been a great spring. If we dare reflect back on last April, not only were we in the hunker down of sheltering in place, with most everything closed to the public (including worship in the church building), we had a lot of cold and shoveable snow to boot. So in comparison to a year ago, we can certainly say that things are looking up. Whereas we couldn't be in the pews for Easter of 2020 at all, this year it was a great joy to worship in the sanctuary for Easter Sunday with as many as 135 masked worshipers at once, safely distanced

in every other pew. As we continue to enjoy gathering together with our family of faith at St. Michael this Easter season, we do so with a renewed optimism for the future, saying with a certain sigh of relief that things are starting to look up.

In some respects, we're finding that our new normal is better than our old normal. This is especially true when it comes to gathering worship attendance information. Now, guests coming through the front door for worship have an opportunity to sign the guest book and receive a welcome packet from a greeter. Once in the pew, guests and members alike have an attendance card in the pew rack that can be completed "touch-less" by scanning the QR code with their smartphone which will then take them to an electronic attendance form. Furthermore, now those worshiping with us via our livestream on Facebook or YouTube can also register their attendance through an online form.

The online attendance data can then be added to the attendance of those in the pews to give us a true total of how many worshiped with us at any given worship service, even telling us who they are (like in the good old days!). And speaking of looking up, May 13 is the day in which the Church celebrates "The Ascension of Our Lord." Forty days after Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday, Acts 1 tells us that Jesus rose still higher as He literally floated up into heaven as the disciples stared up in wonder at the clouds. Then two angels appeared and promised them that Jesus would return again someday in the same way in which He left. So ever since then, the Church has been looking up, lifting up our heads for our redemption is drawing near (Luke 21:28). It is this promise of Christ's return that keeps us looking up

no matter how bad things might get here below. We really have no reason to be down in the mouth. and down in the dumps, even when there's much to get us down in this fallen world. We can keep on looking up because we have "been raised with Christ." By His enabling power we can "seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God." The Holy Spirit who lives within us helps us set our minds on things above and assures us that when Christ who is our life appears we "also will appear with Him in glory" (see Colossians 3:1-4).

May this heavenly perspective cheer us and fill us with hope no matter what comes our way. May we keep on looking up, no matter what we might hear on the news or read on the internet. May we keep on "looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right

hand of the throne of God" (Hebrews 12:2). Let us look up to Him in prayer, look up to Him in worship, and then look out to our neighbor and for our neighbor with His love.

We value worship, as we gather around God s Word and Sacraments, that is meaningful and uplifting, including clear, relevant preaching. We appreciate both traditional liturgy and hymns as well as contemporary music and desire variety and quality in all our worship services so that we might have a meaningful experience of praising and glorifying God with the best that we have. Colossians 3:16-17

When we gather together for worship here in our sanctuary at St. Michael, or at home online, there is one focal point that always grabs my attention: **the red eternal flame** suspended at the south end of the sanctuary behind the altar. It's a small, red flame that may very well go unnoticed, and yet it is always burning. It never goes out!

This eternal flame can remind us of a few things:

• One: Jesus Christ is the light of the world; the light no darkness can overcome. I love coming to our sanctuary



when it is full of people and music and song! But I *also* enjoy coming to our sanctuary when it is dark and quiet... because no matter how dark and quiet it is, that eternal flame is always burning. One point of light in the middle of a dark space... and that reminds me that;

• Two: Even before we enter the sanctuary, our Lord is already present. This is HIS church, and He lovingly invites us to enter and receive His eternal gifts. This perhaps may be even more special to those who are unable to attend physically at this time. Our Lord has promised that He will be with us always, even to the end of the age. And this is true no matter where we gather together!

• Three: There are times when our own fervor may seem to sputter out... but the love of Jesus will never dwindle. We all have times when our faith and trust in God seems to grow dim. Thank God for His faithfulness and love! Jesus OFTEN came to people who were at the end of their rope, and He continues to do so today!

God bless you all as you continue to receive God's free gifts, and when your own flame of faith seems to be running low, remember that God's love for you will never fade away. The next time you are in our sanctuary (or see it online), take a few moments to reflect upon that red flame, and remember how Jesus has promised you that He will never leave or forsake you. God's love for **you** has been sealed and delivered to you by His grace through Jesus Christ.



## EXPLORE OUR NEW AND IMPROVED LIBRARY

Something wonderful is waiting for you in the church library.

Step inside its door from the Welcome Center and you will find a new section, updated with dozens of new titles, waiting for you to browse and borrow. All casual reading materials – both fiction and non-fiction titles – have been consolidated to the corner nearest the sanctuary.

This is the first major improvement specifically for adults, since the library's 2004 opening. Besides newly arranged bookcases, the area features additional lighting, a self-checkout station, a spinning magazine rack, and a tiered display of new arrivals.

Coinciding with the changes, the library is now open and staffed every Sunday between services. Visit between 9:45 to 11 a.m. as a convenient – albeit, much smaller – substitute for the Portage District Library, which has been relocated for a year for building renovations.

Stop in with your children, and they too can borrow from our extensive collection of books for preschoolers through middle school. Threefourths of the library is devoted to children's materials, which include picture books, beginning readers, chapter books, and non-fiction titles.

And now searching the collection is even easier, too. The library has its own website where you can browse its online catalogue from the convenience of your computer or electronic device. It's linked to the church website or it can be accessed by downloading a free app called <u>Librista</u>.

For those unfamiliar with borrowing from the library, here's a quick summary:

\* If you are in the church directory, you have a library card. One is issued for every family.

\* Watch for an email about your library card number or visit the library to learn it. You must enter it to reserve or renew books online (but you can search the catalogue without logging in).

\* Library materials can be borrowed for two weeks. There are no late fees, but you will be charged the replacement value for any lost or damaged items.

\* Up to 15 books can be borrowed per library card. If the church directory lists children at home, you may borrow more books. The limit is 25 per family.

\* Return your borrowed materials at the circulation desk or by dropping them in a new Book Return next to the library door in the Welcome Center.

We hope to see you soon in our newly improved library!

## WHAT WILL THEY SAY?

Our own mortality is often thrown in our face in very dramatic ways. Recently a young man, in college with his entire life ahead of him, died very suddenly, unexpectedly. The reactions were those of shock, disbelief and total devastation for the family. Friends mourned by giving heartfelt testimonies about the young man. They spoke of what a great friend he was, how he always put them first and reached out to them. But they also recalled story after story about how he lived his faith. They knew about his Christian faith because that's how he lived, not because he went to church. He openly shared his faith with others.

Which brings me to the question of the day; What will they say about you, when God calls you home? The details and facts of your life will surface, but what will be the first things remembered? Will they tell tales of great hunting or fishing exploits? Wonderful dinners or delicious desserts may be explained in ways to make your mouth water. Stories of always being available to lend a helping hand are always fondly remembered. But will they also tell how you shared your faith, inviting others to follow Jesus? While doing all those other things is nice, the most important thing is making sure the people you encountered knew about the saving grace of Christ.

I found some interesting definitions recently. A Believer is someone who follows Jesus and will go to Heaven. A Disciple is someone who follows Jesus but will bring others with them when they go.

#### Christian Homes!! (I'm not joking.)

I am looking for 5-6 Christian families to host foreign exchange students this next school year, either for the whole school year (Aug-June) or for a 5-month semester (either fall or winter). My goal is to have several Lutheran families, including families with children, empty-nesters, and couples and/or singles, from within our Kalamazoo County Lutheran community accept students into their homes and give them a wonderful crosscultural learning experience. This experience could include teaching the student about our Christian/Lutheran faith, and/or at the very least, giving them first-hand exposure to the lives and habits of loving, open-hearted Christians.

My firm belief is that we, as Americans and as Christians, often get a "bad wrap" in the eyes of the international world. People of other nations and faiths often believe we are ethnocentric, judgmental people who judge and shun others different from us. (Sadly, this does happen, both internationally and intranationally as well.) There is a dire need to show people Christ at the most basic level—by sharing our homes, lives and love with them directly.



My husband, John, and I were host parents to a young Turkish-Muslim girl from Frankfurt, Germany for one school year (2002-03). *To note:* There is a huge Turkish-Muslim population there who we learned are often treated very poorly by German citizens, from bus drivers and teachers to shop owners, police officers and even Christian clergy—people with whom they have daily contact.

Now mind you, we weren't seeking out this opportunity at all. It all began one day while I was at work, managing Children's Protective Services (CPS) with numerous investigations, court reports and case files piled high on my desk awaiting my approval. A CPS worker from another unit entered my office and plopped himself in a chair across from me. His first words, "So....Do you want a kid?" I stared at him expressionless, overwhelmed by my work, and said,... "Jim, get out of my office." (You'd have to know my humor—Jim was used to it—and bowled right over me smiling, and repeated his question.) I then asked, "What is it? Are you referring to one of our court wards? Do you need me to sit with her while you go to court?" Jim pulled out a Polaroid snapshot of a teenage girl with her arms around two other teenagers, and told me to "...look at the

one in the middle with the big smile." He explained that the three teens were "exchange students" from Germany, and that the middle girl, who wanted to come to America more than



anyone else in her group, was the only child without a placement. He explained that she was muslim and her birthday was 9-11, and that no one wanted her because of that. (Mind you...It was July 2002, and 9-11 had happened less than one year before.) I knew Jim was seriously advocating for this child, someone he had met personally when he went to Germany to visit his former exchange student. My heart sank as I thought of the ridiculousness of her rejections and the desperation of her plight to come to the USA as she watched months pass, the school year get closer, and no "taker." In my heart, I started to grow more compassionate by the minute and a bit indignant that "I wasn't going to stand by and watch this nonsense. Why not talk it over with my husband and kids? It could be a great opportunity!!" Less than a month later, we picked up 17 year old Huelya at the Kalamazoo airport, and I cannot remember ever seeing a smile as big as hers. It was as close to "love at first sight" as any one of us had ever encountered.

Bringing our "German daughter", Huelya, into our home was one of the best experiences we shared as a family. She taught us things about her culture and Muslim traditions that we would not have otherwise learned, and a great benefit was the broadening of our own children's human and cultural perspectives. She was eager to learn about and immerse herself in our culture and experience our foods, clothing trends

and traditions, and connect herself with other young people, including our two daughters, as soon as she could. Our 9-month experience with her morphed into a natural adoption by us as her "American parents", a term which she and her family still lovingly call us today. We made a long-lasting connection with her, and by extension, her parents



and relatives, both in Germany and Turkey, who have invited us to come stay with them in their homes. Both Huelya and her parents refer to us as their "Christian family in the US", and thanked us for showing "beautiful love and acceptance" to their daughter during the time she lived with us. Huelya is able to speak openly about what she learned about the Christian faith while with us, and the word "Christian" is a "good word" now in their family. This fall, John and I are seriously considering bringing another foreign exchange student into our home, at least for part of the school year. I, for one, am excited about bringing a young person back into our empty nest and toting them and their friends around to school and community events they become involved in. The "empty nest" syndrome has been admittedly hard on me, as it has been on so many others with lots of love and more parenting still to give. We are looking for other Lutheran-Christian homes at St. Michael and Immanuel who may also want to host an exchange student in their home. The idea would be that we could be mutual supports to one another, hold our quarterly gatherings together (which are mandatory per exchange agency policy), and hold these meetings at one of our churches. Hosting these gatherings at a church may also help plug the students into youth group meetings and outings, giving them all the more a positive experience amongst Christians, and developing the strong, personal friendships that all children need. Also, I reason, if more exchange students can take back to their communities their stories of loving Christian families and friends who gathered around them while they were here, we stand a much better chance of taking our Lord's "good news" to the ends of the world, as we have been commissioned to do. We ask for us... and for you... for the power of the Holy Spirit to give us courage and guidance to live our lives looking upwards and outwards to others (the Great Commission), so that they may be drawn to Jesus.

Would you please consider giving a foreign student a positive, crosscultural learning experience that includes exposure to our Christian/ Lutheran faith and families, as well as full immersion in our American culture and school system this coming school year? If so, I'd love to hear from you!! As an Area Representative for **International Student Exchange (ISE)**, and one who can personally vouch for its long-proven expertise and professionalism, I can help you get your foreign student, aka "new family member", into your home this August....or at least help you begin to "think about it," pray about it, and make a good decision for your family situation. No rush!

Please keep in mind that all ISE students will receive Covid-19 screening 2-3 days before boarding a plane headed to the U.S., and will be willing to quarantine for 7 days and take a new Covid-19 test once they arrive at your home, if that's what you would prefer. These students are so excited about the prospects of coming to the U.S. that they will agree to whatever guidelines you'd like them to follow. We can talk more about that, if interested. ISE has many built many provisions into their policies to ensure that any Covid-19 exposure or illness will be handled appropriately, with full health insurance coverage for each student. In the event of a student becoming seriously ill here, there are even provisions for a student's natural parent to be flown here and put up in a shelter where they can care for their child. (Chances of needing to do this are very slim due to the natural, albeit unexplained, tendency for younger people to fight off Covid symptoms and recover more quickly than the rest of us.)


