"MAKING THE BEST USE OF THE TIME"

As the new year begins, I'm up to over 300 consecutive days of using the app on my cell phone called *Duolingo* in order to learn German. I had studied German in college and the seminary, but it was largely to make sense of theological terms like *Heilsgeschichte* and *Offenbarungen*, and not to speak it conversationally. Lord willing, Dana and I will be leading a trip to Germany at the end of September of 2022 and it would good to know how to ask how much something costs or where to find *das Badezimmer*. If you would like to consider joining the tour we're going to have an informational meeting in Allan Hall on January 11 at 6:30 pm (and the itinerary and other details can be found in this newsletter and on our mightymessengers.org website).

If you've ever used *Duolingo*, you know that at the end of every lesson is an opportunity to earn points by watching a little commercial, often an invitation to download a game app. One such ad I got was for a Sudoku game. I've seen the game many times but frankly never learned to play it. So I thought I'd watch a quick YouTube video about it. The video was only about five minutes long, but most of it told me way more than I wanted or needed to know. Simply explaining how to play the game could have been done in less than 30 seconds. So, even though I did learn to play Sudoku, I resented a bit how the video had unnecessarily wasted my time. Of course, if I ever do take the time to play Sudoku I'll probably feel like it was an even bigger waste of time.

The fact is, there are lots of things that I do that are a waste of time (like watching football on TV or inane sitcoms on Netflix), but I do them anyway because I find them enjoyable, relaxing, or even rejuvenating. So maybe they're not a complete waste of time, but I do think about how much more I could be accomplishing if I wasn't doing them (like learning more German!). Our time is indeed a precious commodity. No one knows just how much time they will have on earth, but we know that we only have so much of it and then it's gone. So however we choose to use our time, it is always an expenditure, perhaps it is an investment, and whenever we use it for others it is a gift to them. So it is that God urges us to "Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time, because the days are evil. Therefore, do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is" (Ephesians 5:15-17).

A new year is a good opportunity to consider the times, reflecting back on the old year passing, but also looking forward to the days that are ahead and trying to imagine what 2022 will be like. One of my favorite things to do in a new year is to set goals for myself of what I hope to accomplish and to set in place some new practices that I hope would be an improvement on the old. As a congregation, we're going to have a special opportunity to consider how to make the most of our time on earth when we have our "Forty Days of Discovery" during Lent (staring March 2). It will be a time to discover what God has to say in the Bible about our reason for existence as His creatures, not only for our time on earth, but even for our existence beyond time in heaven. For forty days, we're going to be reading every day in the 2012 edition of Rick Warren's book, The Purpose Driven Life, and discussing it in small groups with the aid of updated videos. Whether you were with us or not when we did something similar in 2004, we're confident that God will use this to bless our congregation and help us all grow as disciples of our Lord Jesus, who used His time on earth for our eternal salvation.

I pray that this new year gives us all the excitement of new beginnings, and that the Holy Spirit provides us with the determination to be good stewards of each of the 365 days of 2022. May God use this new year as a time in which we grow in faith and in our relationship with Him to the point that we are determined to live each day for His purposes and to His glory. There's no greater way to make the most of our time on earth. We all have a limited amount of time. We can spend the time we have trying to acquire what we can't keep, or we can spend our time giving away what we can't lose.

"Angel in the Waters" is a simple, non-confrontational book that makes young children decidedly pro-life long before they ever hear the word "abortion." This special hardcover book tells a special story. It's the first story of every child of God: In its mother's womb, a tiny baby grows, explores the waters, and talks with the angel who is there. With gentle illustrations and wise words, author Regina Doman tells the story of that baby and the angel in the waters ... a story that will delight all young children, because the journey from conception to birth is their story, too.




TITLE: Abandoned: the untold story of the abortion wars AUTHOR: Monica Migliorino Miller

Every day, thousands of children -- fragile, innocent, alone -- are abandoned. They are brutally snuffed from the world and left in the trash ... and it's all legal. "Abandoned: The Untold Stories of the Abortion Wars" is the story of those children abandoned by abortion, and it is the story of their courageous defenders. Since 1976, Monica Miller has defended the unborn. She has counseled pregnant women outside abortion clinics and organized pro-life groups and sit-ins at many of those same clinics. She has blocked abortionists' cars, been arrested, and gone to jail. And she has pulled the bodies of thousands of unborn babies out of dumpsters and given them a proper burial. "Abandoned" is the profound, breathtaking, and often daring journey of one woman. It also is a history of the Pro-Life movement since Roe vs. Wade and a plea for the protection of the most helpless and innocent members of the human family.

Based on the biography of the same title (also in our church library), "Unplanned" is the inspiring true story of one woman's journey of transformation. All Abby Johnson wanted to do was help women. As one of the youngest Planned Parenthood clinic directors in the nation, she was involved in 22,000 abortions as she counseled women about their reproductive choices. Her passion about a woman's right to choose also led her to become a spokesperson for Planned Parenthood and to fight for legislation defending the cause she so deeply believed in. But all that changed the day Abby participated in an actual abortion procedure. What she saw prompted her to quit her job, join her former enemies at the Coalition for Life, and become one of the most ardent pro-life speakers in America. Telling Abby's story from both sides of the abortion clinic property line, "Unplanned" is a must-see movie for anyone who cares about the life versus rights debate and helping women who face crisis pregnancies.

ST. MICHAEL LUTHERAN SCHOOL

Annual Update January 2022

St. Michael Lutheran School and Christ for Kids Childcare are outreach ministries of St. Michael Lutheran Church with the mission of ministering to and sharing the Gospel with students, their families, and the greater community, as well as providing a superior education for all students. As an educational ministry, we believe that all children can learn and succeed and therefore accept all children that our resources and expertise allow us to educate. This is accomplished through having fully certified teachers in every classroom with a continuous commitment to professional growth and improvement in our programs. We believe in teaching the whole child - spiritually, socially, emotionally and cognitively. We work to provide a level of education that is more in-depth and higher in quality than other educational options in our area.

Enrollment

The School ministry enrollment for the 2021-202 school year includes preschool (64), K-8 (108), and childcare (71) for a total of 243 students served. With the coming of COVID, total enrollment in the K-8 program has seen an increase from our annual average of 95. Since 2001, 237 individuals have become members of St. Michael Lutheran Church through the school ministry.

Tuition Assistance

This school year a total of \$32,900 of tuition assistance was awarded to 15 qualifying families. This assistance benefits 23 children. Since 2005, close to \$425,000 in tuition assistance has been awarded to qualifying families. Most of the tuition assistance funding comes through a number of events including the Tuition Assistance Dinner, Golf Outing, and the Gerri Wheeler Scholarship Fund, along with many generous donations. This fund is always in need of donations so please consider a tax-deductible gift.

Staff

SMLS and CFK together employ 33 staff – 12 in the school and 21 in the preschool/childcare. There are a number of individuals, including tutors, school psychologists, speech and occupational therapists, who frequent the school to meet the needs of our students. Portage Public Schools provides (at no cost) four certified teachers for Art, Band, Gym, and Technology, through the Shared Time program.

Tuition Income

Based upon the 2022 budget projections, the school will generate approximately 45% of the total anticipated income from the school ministry, while the Childcare/Preschool will generate approximately 54% with a small fraction of uncollected income at year's end. Tuition is collected through an automatic account deduction program called *Tuition Express*.

Service Projects

The school participates in a number of ministry projects throughout the course of the year. This year the following organizations will have benefitted from the efforts of SMLS students: Samuel's Blankets; World Mission; Camp Concordia; Camp Luther Haven; the Michigan District's *Hearts for Jesus* initiative; the SMLC Trunk or Treat; Lutheran World Relief; and the American Heart Association. Additionally, our students regularly send cards and letters to shut-ins from St. Michael Lutheran Church.

Curriculum/Programs

The school continues to offer a strong academic program. Kindergarten students arrive in 1st grade as eager readers. Our lowa Test of Basic Skills standardized test scores continue to be above the national average and fall in the top 10 among Lutheran schools in the Michigan District that administer this assessment. The curriculum meets or exceeds state standards. Students in grades 1-8 enjoy weekly Art, physical education, vocal music (K-4), computer (K-8), Beginning Band (5) and Concert Band (6-8). SMLS also offers various enrichment classes after school in a program known as *After the Bell*.

The school has an excellent working relationship with Portage Public Schools. Bus service for our students is provided by PPS and our school is a transfer point for their buses. It is common to see many buses move in and out of the parking lot at the close of each school day. PPS also provides limited special education services as well as the sharing of professional development opportunities with our staff.

Sports

Before the days of COVID-19, SMLS participated in an 8-member private school sports league. Currently, this league is no longer functioning, a victim of the pandemic and concern by many of the participating schools about health safety. In normal times, SMLS offers fall co-ed soccer, Girls' volleyball and basketball, and Boys' basketball. We continue to offer *Girls' On the Run* as well as our community basketball camp offered each year in early August despite the pandemic.

St. Michael Lutheran School is accredited by three separate organizations including National Lutheran Schools Accreditation and we continue to work on improving our programs with the goal of touching more lives for Jesus. The school will be renewing accreditation again in the spring of 2022 and we are all busy preparing for that process. This ministry would not be possible without the financial support and prayers of the members of St. Michael Lutheran Church and I ask that you continue to pray for this ministry that influences so many lives.





"BECAUSE OF BETHLEHEM" BY MAX LUCADO

After attending the new Christmas special "The Chosen," I thought I was moved to find some more inspiration about Christmas from reading through the book "Because of Bethlehem". Max Lucado is very inspiring and always uplifting. Here's some of what I learned:

"Jesus entered our world not 'like' a human but 'as' a human. He endured puberty, pimples, hot

Seeing so many nativities out in the neighborhood, we understand that Jesus was born a baby, but there is no information about him growing into a toddler, a young boy or a teenager. He reappears as a man in his early thirties.

Why did God go so far to prepare this journey for His son?

"A chief reason is this: he wants you to know that he gets you. He understands how you feel and has faced what you face. Jesus is not 'out of touch with our reality'; He's been through weakness and testing, experienced it all – all but the sin. So why not walk right up to him and get what he is so ready to give. Take the mercy, accept the help" (Hebrews 4:14-16)

"Jesus radiates God's own glory and expresses the very character of God. Jesus himself stated, "Anyone who has seen me has seen the Father" (John 14:9

"Anyone who has seen me weep has seen the Father weep."

REQUEST FOR ENDOWMENT FUND DISTRIBUTIONS DURING 2022

Hello church members. It has been an amazing year of growth in 2021 for the Endowment Funds at St. Michael. At the beginning of the year there was \$463,684 in the Endowment Fund (this included designated funds towards specific ministries and what we call the "General" fund.) By Sept. 30 this had grown to nearly \$685,000 with more than \$196,000 in new contributions. Two new designated funds were established by members: The Maxine M. June Flower Fund and the School Scholarship Fund. A full financial report will be provided in February.

We need your help if you would like money to help support St. Michael Lutheran Church and School ministries. During 2021, approximately \$9,500 from the general endowment fund helped support ministries such as Lutheran World Relief, Quilting Ministry, Youth For Christ and renovations of Allan Hall. We anticipate having about \$10,000 to distribute during 2022. In addition, another \$7,500 was given for school staffing salaries and scholarships.

If you are interested in applying for some portion of this money for a ministry during 2022 please note the following:

Members, ministry leaders and Board Directors are encouraged to identify mission and ministry programs within the Church or School that you believe need financial support above and beyond those provided through the General Fund Budget. Or if there is a worthwhile community or even global ministry, where you would like to request funding, please complete a Grant Request form and submit it to the Endowment Fund Committee by February 15. These forms are available in the church office, from Jay or any of the committee members

The Endowment Fund Committee will evaluate all Grant Requests and decide which requests will or will not be funded based on the priorities and goals of St. Michael Lutheran Church and School. All those who submitted a request will be informed accordingly by April 1.

The Financial Secretary will arrange for transfer of the approved amount from the Endowment Fund account to the respective ministry account.



The comments below were a journal entry from my late wife, Sherry, written about four years ago, after the death of her father and her own metastatic cancer diagnosis.



As I reflected on these words, they struck me as something each of us could strive to live out, to make a difference in the world we inhabit.

"Three days ago, we buried my dad. He lived 96 years and people loved him. He was a kind, cheerful and loving dad.

In thinking of what I want people to say, I was reminded that would require something on my end. How do I need to live so that I leave the lasting impression I want?

I want people to see Jesus in me. How is this achieved?

I need to walk the walk. I need to trust Jesus totally with this diagnosis. I need to not live in fear. I need to remember that He is in control. Also, I need to put other's needs in front of my own. If I want people to see Jesus in me, people need to know they matter. Phone calls, lunch dates, and texts go a long way. I need to spend time with people that need a friend, not necessarily who bring me joy.

I want my family to feel loved, supported and encouraged by me. I want them to know without a doubt that they are prayed for, loved and that they can count on me. How?

I need to pray for them individually. I need to ask for specific prayer requests from them. I need to love unconditionally and not give advice when it isn't wanted.

I want to be the best friend anyone could ask for. How?

I want to be reliable, dependable and there for them under any circumstance. I want to pray for them and follow up on things they have shared, to show them I care.




