EXTRA EPIPHANY LIGHT

It's a full two-month long Epiphany season this year, so that all of February gives us the luxury of continuing to get to know the Person of Jesus better before we must enter into that time called Lent, in which we especially focus on His saving Work of suffering and dying on the cross for our salvation (prior to His Easter resurrection). Getting to know Jesus better is indeed a wonderful thing for us to do as ones who have been called by the Gospel into a saving faith relationship with Him. So let us continue to worship Him each week and see Him demonstrate His divinity through His remarkable words and miraculous actions. As we discover more about who Jesus is as the eternal Son of God, we will be all the more prepared to follow Him through His Lenten Passion and to appreciate the reason for His suffering.

But Epiphany is not the only season of discovery. This year, Lent is going to be for us "40 Days of Discovery" as our whole congregation will be invited to focus on the reason for our existence in this world 40 Days which God loves and for which of Discovery He gave His life. We will all be




reading each day from the book entitled The Purpose Driven Life: What on Earth Am I Here For? by New York Times bestselling author Rev. Rick Warren of Saddleback Church near Los Angeles, CA. Some of you have read his book when it first came out in 2003 and we had our "Forty Days of Purpose" shortly thereafter. But the book was revised in 2012 and there are updated videos for our use in the Small Groups. Angle Heimlich has been working hard on the small group component, and would love to hear of your willingness to host/lead a group, or that the group you are currently in, is willing to take up this curriculum for the six weeks of Lent (or longer, if your group meets less often).

You'll find in this newsletter the schedule of how the topics are laid out in the Lenten season. The daily readings in the book begin on Ash Wednesday and a new topic and a new week of readings begins every Wednesday thereafter. There will be thematic worship services both on Wednesday nights and on the weekends that will be especially designed to further reinforce what you are reading and discussing in your small groups. Altogether, this will make for a powerful six weeks of devoting our attention to God's purpose for our existence on this planet, and helping us see in practical ways how we can live out our calling as His children and our mission of making mighty messengers for Christ. Please plan to be a part of it, and prayerfully make your Lenten experience this year not merely a time to give up something, but a time to gain something special, to discover the meaning of life and the very purpose of your eternal existence in Christ.

In the meantime, we have an added bonus for you in this Epiphany season: a Voters Assembly Meeting at noon on February 27, in which you can consider the current state of the congregation's Long-Range Plan, and cast a vote for the new officers and Lav Ministers that will be on the ballot for the next twoyear term. This is the year in which we especially elect the Vice President of the congregation and the various Assistant Directors of Boards (as well as several Lay Ministers and Endowment Fund Committee members). The Long-Range Plan is developed every five years, but it is also reviewed every year to see what has been accomplished and what more we would like to accomplish by God's grace within that five year period of time. The Long-Range Plan is intended to give direction to our nine administrative Boards for their annual planning, so that the whole congregation is working together toward achieving the same goals spelled out in the plan. You'll have an opportunity to see these things prior to the VA meeting, and to discuss them at a Town Hall meeting between services at 9:45 am on February 13. Please plan to be with us at that time.

So 2022 is off and running, but no matter how fast it may already be going, we're careful not to get out ahead of God. He is leading, and we are following. May the Lord of the Church show us His good way forward as we continue to serve Him, and bring His love and light to our congregation and community to the glory of His holy name.

n writing *The Purpose Driven Life: What on Earth am I Here for?*, Rick Warren desired to answer three important questions for his readers: Why I am I alive? Does it matter? What is my purpose?

He answers these questions by reminding us that It all starts with God! You are NOT an accident! You are made to last forever; your life is a temporary assignment and there is a reason for everything! When you see your life from God's perspective, you understand what should be driving your life.

I picked up the *Purpose Driven Life* book this past summer knowing that I would benefit from reading this book again. I was part of the "Forty Days of Purpose" that our congregation did almost 20 years ago. With each day I read, I found myself wanting to read more. I found it refreshing and inspiring! I was excited to share my experience with all of you at St. Michael Lutheran Church and School!

I appreciated the reminder that life is not about me! In our current "me first" culture, I find myself reminding both myself and my kids that life does not and should not cater to me or them! Below is a definition of Individualism, a popular world view in our culture.

"Individualism is the belief that life is about me. The purpose of life is to be authentic to yourself and to live according to your feelings without obligation to anyone or anything beyond the self. Sin involves being inauthentic, and salvation comes from discovering "yourself". (So the Next Generation Will Know by, Sean McDowell and J. Warner Wallace)

It's easy to get caught up with the "me first" cultural belief. We need to be reminded often that God does have a purpose for our life! He desires for us to include him in every area of our life and to depend on him to give us everything we need for each new day!

I know that I need to be reminded often that everything I do matters to God. He does not want us to just "get through the day," or the week, or the month. God desires for us to connect to Him, through His word daily, remembering that

each of us is His child, created to do good works even before we were born. He wants to work in us and through us! This happens in a variety of ways: when we attend church and receive the sacrament of the Lord's supper, when we have conversations with God throughout the day, when we pray with our family, when we read God's word and do devotions. These are all ways that we stay attached to the vine.

When we take part in a small group Bible study or St. Michael's Learning Hour, connect with a mission organization such as Jesus loves Kalamazoo, or volunteer at our church or within our community, we are giving God the opportunity to increase our understanding of who He is and what our purpose is beyond our job and family. He calls for us to live in community, serving within our church and finding ways to support and care for our surrounding communities.

I hope you will join me in reading Rick Warren's *The Purpose Driven Life* and participating in our "40 Days of Discovery" that we will be engaged with during Lent this year! We will be offering a variety of small group options for the video-based Bible study that hopefully will fit everyone's schedule. If you have never experienced a small group community, now is the perfect time to give it a try! Lent is the perfect time to give up a little of our time so that we might gain and grow in our relationship with Jesus! You will be blessed!!!


PRAYING THE PSALMS WITH JESUS

Martin Luther once said, "The Psalms are a Little Bible, wherein everything contained in the entire Bible is beautifully and briefly comprehended" ... and how true Luther was in saying so! If you take a few moments to look through our orders of service, you will notice how many of the Psalms are interwoven throughout. The Psalms (which, as God's Word, are inspired by the Holy Spirit), speak God's grace and truth into our time of worship together.

But the Psalms are also a reflection of the full human experience. The range of emotion contained in God's Psalms portray expressions of anger, grief, terror, zeal, deep love, and ultimate trust in His goodness. There are Psalms that convey God's unending mercy... and then there are Psalms that call down God's unbounded wrath against His enemies. There are Psalms that repent of deep-felt sin, and then Psalms that cry out for justice based upon a clean and upright heart. The Psalms are holy and down to earth at the same time.

When we pray the Psalms, we do so with Jesus at our side. In the end, Jesus Himself is the perfect embodiment of the heart of the Psalms. They are *His* cry to our Heavenly Father, praying on our behalf for mercy, justice, thanksgiving, and joyful love. When we pray the Psalms in worship, and at home, we do with Jesus at our side. So when you come to worship next, or when you find yourself at home having devotions, take a look at the Psalms. Spend some quality, quiet, intentional time reading and hearing about how much God knows and loves you.

Our Lord Jesus Christ has had mercy on us, even though we did not deserve it. Our ingratitude should be punished, but instead He forgave it and gave us even more. Our wickedness should be judged as worthy of hell, but He gave His own Son hell and us heaven instead. 

We have a standing order with a local florist for two floral arrangements, to be appropriate for the liturgical season, in the chancel for every weekend. Two sponsors per week may select dates on this calendar on a first-come basis. The cost to be a sponsor for one arrangement is \$50. (Two arrangements would be \$100.) Look for the Calendar & Envelopes near the Usher's station. Sponsors' checks should be made payable to: St. Michael Lutheran Church, with the funds designated for the Flower Fund. Sponsors of the floral arrangements will be acknowledged in the church's member email preceding the sponsored weekend and be noted in the pre-service worship slides to encourage and remind members of the opportunity to sponsor floral arrangements.

Members who have paid for the floral arrangements may take them home after the late service on Sunday. Floral arrangements that are not sponsored by a member will be removed by the Altar Guild.




2021-2022 LCMS SCHOOL YEAR THEME






DISCIPLESHIP Christian education is vital to our Spiritual health and growth.


So much is happening in February for the youth in OUTREACH please come and be part of the fun!

LAC BROCHET, MANITOBA—UPDATE!

The St. Michael LAMP Team's last visit to Lac Brochet was in July 2019 (ninth year of going to Lac Brochet to teach VBS and lead Bible Studies). Lac Brochet is located in the northern most part of Manitoba and can only be reached by air in the summer (or ice roads in the winter). They are an isolated Dene community of about 1000 people.

Since the pandemic began we have had to limit our communication with our friends to Facebook, phone calls and sending packages for the children.

Our latest project is to collect valentines for the children and adults and send them there to encourage and brighten their day. There is a valentine collection box in the Communications Center until February 13, and then they will be mailed to Lac Brochet.



Lac Brochet currently has a COVID outbreak.



It is especially hard for the people in Lac Brochet because they do not have a hospital in the community. There is a nurses station where they can get medical attention, but that is limited and it is a one hour flight away to get to the nearest hospital. This makes them especially vulnerable during the pandemic.



In order to deal with the boredom and to help promote healthy activities the community has been hosting contests where individuals and households make a project—quilt, stuffed animal, picture frame.... Or make a video of dancing or singing under special categories. These are posted on Facebook and the community votes and prizes are awarded!



With COVID in the community they are not allowing anyone to come in or go out of Lac Brochet. They have stopped all public activities and are confined to their homes. Their homes are small and often overcrowded with extended family all living together, so this is particularly difficult for them with the outside temp being around -30 Degrees and less than 9 hrs. of daylight.



Can a St. Michael LAMP Team go to Lac Brochet in August 2022? We will see what the next couple of months tell us. Pray that we can. If you have interest in possibly being part of the team talk with— Dana Naumann 269-808-7832.

This is an article written by Dan Lane, Armstrong Chaplain. The in-house Pastor (yes they do have one) at Armstrong International in Three Rivers:

As Jesus hung on the cross, he said "It is finished." But, what was it that was finished?

After taking on all of our sins beginning in the Garden of Gethsemane, through all the beatings, and finally while hanging on the cross, the words "It is finished" did not mean that Jesus was totally finished. In fact, what Jesus had accomplished and finished was providing for our redemption. He had borne our punishment. Settled our debt. Torn down the wall of separation between God and us. And, in



forgiving our sins, removed the wrath that God had toward those sins. But Jesus was not finished yet.

When Mary Magdalene and the disciples came to the tomb of Jesus, what did the see? Emptiness. No body. The linen wrappings for burial that Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus had wrapped the body of Jesus in so lovingly, were now empty. He had risen from the dead. The tomb was empty. Jesus was not finished yet.

As Peter and John stooped to look into the tomb, they noticed something as their eyes adjusted to the darkness of the tomb. Curious, they stepped into the tomb. There, something wonderful was folded ever so neatly. It was the face cloth that had been placed over the face of Jesus.

Why is that important? So important that once the disciples saw it, they believed?

God never wastes words. Everything in His Word, the Bible, is inspired and for a purpose. Every detail. He is a God of the details. The folded napkin or face cloth was a sign for these believers. It instantly brought them hope and joy. Their hearts were full now. Full of faith.

Traditional held that when the master of the house sat down to eat, everything was in perfect order and in its perfect place. The servants, once they had set the table, were never allowed to touch that table again until there was a sign signifying that the master had finished his meal.

What sign? When the master had finished, he would wipe his face, fingers, and beard then throw the once neatly folded napkin on the table in a wrinkled mess. This used and discarded napkin told the servants the master was finished. But if the master once again folded the napkin and neatly placed it on the table, it meant he was not finished and was coming back again.

Once dead, a body cannot fold a napkin. Once dead, but alive again. Jesus folded the napkin and left it on the table to say, "Gentlemen, I am alive and not through yet". Jesus was not finished. He was coming back.

Imagine that Herb and Edith are core members of their congregation. They have raised three children in the faith, as those children attended the Lutheran school. Now six of their seven grandchildren are attending that same Lutheran school.

Herb is a retired plumber. Together with Edith they ran their own plumbing business. The Lord blessed them with success. Five years ago they sold the business to someone else. The business maintains its original name and all the clientele passed to the new owner. When they sold it, it netted them \$800,000, in addition to the \$2 million they have saved in their retirement account.

Ten years earlier they had created an estate plan with their attorney. That was before they sold their business. At the time, they had created a \$20,000 gift to ministry as a "tithe" of what would pass through their will. They had not even considered making a gift from the leftovers of their IRA when the Lord calls them home. They put the \$800,000 into an investment account and now it is worth \$1.4 million. At the end of their earthly life they expect there will be over \$2 million of assets remaining, and the investment account and IRA have their children receiving 100% of these assets through beneficiary designation.

In recent months, motivated by their thankfulness for the ministry of their home congregation and a desire to see its ministry continue long into the future, they have reconsidered their plan for gifting. They are wondering how to calculate the size of the ministry gift coming from their will. They are also wanting to add to it with disbursements from their investments and IRA. They are wondering which fund from which they should chose and how to fill out the beneficiary designation forms correctly. They want to make a \$500,000 gift to their church for the sake of scholarships for the school. Much to their surprise, each of their children will receive \$500,000 as well.


