GIVE of ourselves to others in loving Christian service and evangelistic witness within the congregation and beyond it to our local community and world.



Fan into Flame the Gift

One of the joys of autumn's cooler weather is sitting by a fire, perhaps in your backyard or fireplace, or at a campsite. I tried to light a fire recently on a cool evening in our patio fire pit but it had been rainy earlier and the damp kindling made it challenging. But that's also part of the fun of having a fire, starting from a fledgling source that must be carefully tended, gently fueled, and fanned into flame. There's a warm feeling of accomplishment when it finally catches ablaze.

This is true in many other areas of life as well. For example, parents and teachers alike lovingly invest a great deal of time and energy sparking a child's initial interests in a variety of things, striving to "train up a child in the way he should go" (Proverbs 22:6). Not everything ignites, but over time they continue to nurture what catches on and ultimately they can bask in the glow of seeing kids fired up with their unique passions.

All of us who have been baptized into Christ have had a flame of faith lit in our hearts by the Holy Spirit through the Gospel. But that faith requires ongoing reinforcing through the same Word of God that started it. We can hardly expect faith to grow without regular fueling and so every day we spend time in prayer and Bible reading. We gather with fellow believers in worship and corporate Bible study, knowing that a once burning coal that is isolated from others will eventually burn out.

But far beyond mere survival, God also wants our faith to grow to the point that we are fired up for Christ. He has made us for a reason, and has given us all our time, talents, and treasure for His special purposes. After all, fire is not just for fun but for

function – heating, cooking, smelting, sanitizing, and a whole host of other utilities. Likewise, our faith is made for action – teaching, witnessing, comforting, administering, leading, and serving in countless ways with the gifts that God has given to us for ministry.

In his second letter to Timothy, St. Paul encourages him to "fan into flame the gift of God which is in you" (2 Timothy 1:6). In context, this refers to Timothy's ordination into the pastoral office, but it can also be applied to every believer in Christ. Your baptism was your ordination into "the royal priesthood (in which you) proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9). Every member of the body of Christ has a unique contribution to make in the mission He has given us.

Our stewardship emphasis this year is *Fan into Flame the Gift.* It begins the first weekend in October and concludes with the Commitment services October 22-23. At that time, we will bring our completed Commitment Form up to the altar and renew our resolve to be active receivers and givers of what God has entrusted to us.



YOUR CHURCH FAMILY

Have you ever heard the story about a pastor who went to visit a parishioner that hadn't been in church for some time? Although this parishioner had been active at his church, something affected him enough that he no longer wanted to get out. After visiting with this parishioner and praying with him, the pastor said he had one more thing he wanted to show this member. So he turned to the warm inviting fireplace and, using tongs, he plucked out a glowing ember from the fire. As they sat there in companionable silence, the glowing ember slowly lost its fire.

In the last two years many Christian Americans have lost their fire about attending church. Sadly, some are still afraid to be in public and others have gotten used to watching a church service on their TV or computer. Although, remotely watching a church service is good, being a part of that service among other believers is so much better.

Adult men and women who attended religious services (including prayer meetings), at least weekly, at age 12 were more likely to report that they were currently "very happy", more likely to report that they receive more attention from others and less likely to indicate that they were frequently bored or more sad than those who had not attended services.

"Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as your see the Day drawing near." Hebrews 10:23-25

I believe that consistently attending church services (including prayer gatherings and small groups), getting to know your "church family", and helping other people will provide increased happiness, less depression and more involvement in community life. This type of life and social engagement can also add years to your life.

"Therefore, as God's chosen people holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another... And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity." Colossians 3:12-14

Herb loves his family. Three years ago, the Lord called home his wife, Betty. Now Herb lives within ten minutes of all four of his children. They are close and do many things together. But one day, Herb was talking with his pastor over lunch and shared that he had concerns about the estate plan he and Betty had put together twenty years ago. At the time, his children were forty years old. His grandchildren were just getting ready for college and most of their estate was planned to support their children, helping them through the expensive time of life. "But now," Herb remarked, "My grandchildren are all out of school. Most of them will make more in ten years than Betty and I did in our entire life. My children are all comfortable. But I am concerned that we are not providing enough financial support to assist the training of future Church workers in the LCMS." 

ENCOURAGEMENT

Our Savior Lutheran Church in Lansing has been my church home for over forty years. Just over thirty years ago I witnessed something amazing. Pastor Eldor F. Bickel was retiring after serving at Our Savior for 33 years. A new pastor was arriving to become the new Senior Pastor. I've been told that this exact situation was considered the absolute worst scenario for young pastors to begin a ministry- a long serving, beloved pastor that was retiring, but planning to stay as member of the congregation.

Rev. David P.E. Maier was that new young pastor arriving in Lansing. The fears of the seminary nightmare stories of the retiring pastor staying on were quickly put to rest. The very first Sunday I saw Pastor Bickel direct some influential women of the church directly to Pastor Maier with their questions. That was the affirmation needed to transition to new pastoral leadership. From that day, the encouraging relationship that developed was a blessing to the entire congregation. Pastor Maier has even described Pastor Bickel as a blessed mentor and like a second father, as they did God's work at Our Savior.

1 Thessalonians 5:11 says, "Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing."

That's exactly what was happening in Lansing thirty years ago and what should be happening all over. It doesn't matter if it is a new pastor, a called servant of twenty plus years or the people you are working with on a committee to further the work of the church.

That encouraging manner shouldn't stop in the church. What a difference a word of praise, a pat on the back or a smile for a job well done, would do in our world. Think about your children or grandchildren who would whole-heartedly welcome that word of encouragement. It could make all the difference in a work relationship to deepen the sense of teamwork and cooperation.

Think about who you can influence today. Who can benefit from you being the hands, feet and voice of Jesus? Isn't that part of the reason Jesus attracted so many, because He took the time to listen and encourage? We may not be able to heal the sick or do miracles, but we can give our time, share the healing message of the Gospel and encourage people in our world.

We can plant the seeds, nurture and watch the Spirit of God work. Thanks in advance for your words of encouragement.

LISTENING MATTERS

Hearing and listening are easily confused. Most of us assume that listening requires no effort and that we are good at it. But good listening requires much more than just being able to hear. As James implored his fellow Christians: "Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry" (James 1:19).



Stephen Ministers are taught how to actively listen — and even spend time cultivating the skill – because it is so powerful in ministering to others. *Would you like to become a better listener?* Here are some tips from the Stephen Ministry team at St. Michael.

1. Be Present

When a person shares a problem with you, they need your full attention. "Active listening" requires that you put aside all other thoughts and seek only to process what is being said.

2. Be Patient

As they share, a speaker may pause to sort out thoughts and complex feelings. Do not interrupt or try to fill silences. Do not share your own experiences. Listening is how you are helping.

3. Withhold Judgment

When the speaker does seek feedback, the best response will convey empathy. A good listener will not judge or try to solve problems. The speaker must trust that you are a safe person.


4. Ask Questions

A good listener seeks to understand. Focus only on the need or problem being shared. Ask for details or clarification. "How were you feeling when that happened?" is a good example.

5. Repeat and Verify

Especially with a difficult topic, the speaker needs to feel heard and understood. Summarize what has been said and include the feelings that you are hearing. This can offer great insight.


