"He Gets Us"

If you watch NFL football as I tend to do on Sunday afternoons, you probably have seen a rather clever ad campaign going on for Jesus called "He Gets Us." You can learn all about it on their website: https://hegetsus.com/en. The page begins by saying "Jesus gets our lives because He was human too." Apparently, the assumption that the authors of this campaign are making is that many people don't get it that Jesus gets us. They are assuming that most people have a stained glass image of Jesus in their minds as one who is so divinely perfect that He is out of touch with us and basically incapable of relating to us ordinary humans.

They've been faulted by some evangelical Christians for this assumption – that people tend to see Jesus as only God and that they need to be reminded that He is fully human like us too. Certainly if people don't believe that Jesus is God, it's no big deal to prove that He's human – after all, what else would He be? I don't know what's the prevailing opinion on the street, but perhaps it is safe to say that even those who do acknowledge Jesus' humanity still figure that He not only has virgin birth but also virgin ears, and that He is not only holy but "holier than thou." In other words, perhaps most people assume that Jesus is easily offended and has a condescending disdain for real life people like us, especially those who might feel marginalized, rejected, or despised by His followers.

Over the years, I've found that the most controversial portrayals of Jesus have not been as the "King of Kings" or the divine character in "The Greatest Story Ever Told," but rather the more human portraits, especially those that overdo His humanity to a fault and make Him faulty, such as "Jesus Christ Superstar" or "Godspell." Thankfully, more recent movies and videos about Jesus seem to get the God/man combination more accurately, and have helped people see Jesus as more like us without compromising His divine character. I'm thinking especially of "The Passion of the Christ" (2004), "The Nativity Story" (2005) and especially the latest streaming series called "The Chosen" (https://watch.angelstudios.com/thechosen) that is really quite well done and captivating.

While the Bible surely reveals Jesus to be God, it also makes an emphatic case for His full humanity. In the Gospels, in addition to recording Jesus doing divine things like performing spectacular miracles, Jesus also gets hungry, He gets angry, He gets tired, He cries, He gets heart broken, He bleeds, and He dies – all very human attributes. When St. John tells us to "test the spirits to see whether they are from God," he goes on to point out that the way we know the Spirt of God is that He will confess that "Jesus Christ has come in the flesh"

(1 John 4:1-2). In fact, the writer to the Hebrews helps us see how Jesus' humanity is essential to our salvation: "Since therefore the children share in flesh and blood, He himself likewise partook of the same things, that through death He might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and deliver all those who through fear of death were subject to lifelong slavery" (Hebrews 2:14-15).

God becoming fully human is the essence of what we celebrate at Christmas time. It's the incarnation of the Son of God. The Athanasian Creed puts it like this: "our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is at the same time both God and man. He is God, begotten from the substance of the Father before all ages; and He is man, born from the substance of His mother in this age: perfect God and perfect man, composed of a rational soul and human flesh; equal to the Father with respect to His divinity, less than the Father with respect to His humanity. Although He is God and man, He is not two, but one Christ: one, however, not by the conversion of the divinity into flesh, but by the assumption of the humanity into God." That's the fancy theological way of saying it. The "He Gets Us" campaign puts it far simpler in a way can be quite comforting and compelling. For example: "Jesus was born to a teenage girl. A girl who was scared and forced to travel far away from her home right before she gave birth. A girl who was at the mercy of a man who could have publicly shamed her or even had her killed, but who instead protected and supported her. A girl who gave birth in a stable because she had nowhere else to go ... Jesus didn't just appear out of nowhere. His life was not some fairytale - it was very real. His first few minutes in this world looked like anyone else's, crying in the arms of his mom. His teen (https://hegetsus.com/en/what-would-jesusthink-of-teen-moms).

I'm certainly not blanket endorsing the "He Gets Us" campaign, but it does seem to be a potentially effective message for our world today, a world that surprisingly still seems to have high regard for Jesus even if it's not so sure about His church. If it helps, remember that Jesus said, "the one who is not against us is for us" (Mark 9:10). So I would say let's capitalize on whatever good might come out of the "He Gets Us" campaign. As St. Paul put it, "whether in pretense or in truth, Christ is proclaimed, and in that I rejoice" (Philippians 1:18). I think I get that.

HELPS STUDENTS WHO MISSED OUT **BECAUSE OF COVID**



Each year the Endowment Committee has the pleasure of distributing money to various St. Michael ministries from the General Endowment Fund. This is done mainly during the first quarter of the year. This year some money was reserved for later in the year should needs arise.

As the new school year commenced in August, Mr. Johnson and teachers noticed some younger students being woefully behind in reading and other core skills. This has been a trend noticed over the past two years and well reported outcome in the education community with the cause being the COVID pandemic. The breaks in continued education and needing to do remote education set these young students back. To help address this issue, St. Michael School needed to buy additional curriculum, do more frequent testing and hired two additional classroom aides.

The Endowment Committee has allocated the remaining \$1,890 of 2022 distributions to the school to help with these costs. It is with thanksgiving and praise we acknowledge our provider for making the Endowment program at St. Michael available for needs like this.

DISCIPLESHIP

Christian education is vital to our Spiritual health and growth.

We value discipleship through the Christian education of children and adults of all ages as essential and vital to our spiritual health and growth. While we highly value people of every age, we are especially excited about our population of young families, many of whom come into our congregation through our Christian education programs for children.

Luke 18:15-17

LEAVE A LEGACY OF DISCIPLESHIP

The familiar passage in Deuteronomy 6 tells us to teach our children biblical truth when we are at home, on the road, lying down, and rising up—basically, all the time. While that may sound overwhelming, it's really simple because it boils down to this: tell your kids about God as you live your daily life.

The word legacy refers to anything that is handed down from the past. It can be property, money, good looks, talents—even behaviors such as disciplined routines or bad habits. The ones that come before us, are remembered for something that outlasts them.

I suspect many Christian parents feel that we want our kids to know Jesus and walk with Him, living out His Word in faith. So, how do we know we're doing everything we can to leave a legacy of discipleship?

According to the *Nothing Less* study by Lifeway Research, reading the Bible is by far the number one thing parents can do to help their children continue to grow in their faith as adults. While this should be no big surprise, it's important to ask ourselves, "Are we really doing this?"

If we want to leave a legacy of discipleship, we must prioritize God's Word. Bible reading can begin at a very young age when we read Bible stories to children while also showing them the bright and beautiful illustrations. As they grow older, we can read a full text Bible with them, and model how to have a devotion time. They should see us reading our own Bibles, because most of our parenting is "caught" not taught. Instead of having your quiet time hidden away, commit to having it — where your children can see you!

Listening to Christian music also has a positive effect on children and can be used as a discipleship tool. Scripture-filled lyrics rooted in sound doctrine really point back to reading God's Word—it's just singing instead!

At every age and stage of childhood—babies, toddlers, preschoolers, preteens, and teenagers can all learn from us as we point out little things that connect to God. For example, we can tell younger kids that God made the trees they see in the park. We can tell older kids that we serve a creative God when they see the same trees. Tying biblical truth to memorable things helps build foundations that lead to a lasting faith. There are countless examples of how to do this. We only need to ask God to make them obvious to us!

Through Bible reading, prayer, serving, and listening to music together, we can leave a legacy of discipleship. These are the everyday habits and practices that lead to kids growing into spiritually healthy adults where they too will disciple others—repeating the legacy again and again.


Additional ways you can be praying:

The history of the Nativity scene

St. Francis of Assisi established the first Nativity scene in 1223 in Grecio, a small town in Italy. As he was preparing for Christmas Eve Mass, St. Francis was trying to think of a way to remind people that Jesus came not as a wealthy king, but as a poor child born among animals. So he wrote to Pope Honorius III and obtained permission to create a living Nativity scene.

In a cave near town, Francis set up an altar. He brought in a manger filled with hay, as well as a live ox and a donkey. He invited the townspeople to come, and he preached about the humble beginnings of the Christ Child.


The idea of re-creating Jesus' birth was very popular. Churches in Italy created displays made out of terra cotta. In the middle of the 1500s, families began to put up Nativity scenes in their homes. And living Nativity scenes like the one that St. Francis started centuries ago remain popular to this day.

Who was there?

The Gospels of Matthew and Luke describe Jesus' birth. Mary, Jesus' mother, and Joseph came to Bethlehem together with their donkey right before Jesus was born. When there was no room at any of the inns for them to stay, they ended up in a stable where animals were kept. So the Nativity scene includes Mary, Joseph, Jesus and the animals in a stable, as well as a manger, or trough, where Baby Jesus slept.

In Luke, we learn about the angel who brought the shepherds "good news of great joy" (Luke 2:10), when Jesus was born, so we include the shepherds and the angel in our Nativity scene.

And in Matthew, Chapter 2, we read about the Wise Men, or Magi, who came to visit Jesus, bringing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. So we add the Wise Men to our Nativity scene as well.






