1 John 4:10

"IN THIS IS LOVE"

Love is always in season, but the month of February, with the annual celebration of St. Valentine's Day, tends to be a time when it gets especially accented. The English word "love" is notoriously ambiguous such that we often wish we had more words to choose from than just one. But the reality is that the limitation of our language forces us to say such things as "I love my wife," "I love golf," and "I love ice cream" all with the single word "love" when obviously we don't mean quite the same thing in every context of its usage. Many have pointed out, including C.S. Lewis in The Four Loves (1960), that in the Bible we have the luxury of several words for "love." There's a separate word for friendly or family love, and for romantic or sexual love, and for committed covenant love, and for altruistic sacrificial love even for the unlovely. But in English we often have to use some other words than simply "love" in order to be more precise in our meaning. For example, we could sign off a Valentine card simply with the word "love," but to our spouse or "lover" we might want to say something like "affectionately yours" or "yours forever," and we probably wouldn't sign off that way to our children or to a friend.

All this being the case, it's not really helpful to say, as many do these days, "love is love." The fact is, "love" needs definition and context in order to be properly understood. A heterosexual could very appropriately say to a homosexual "I love you" and mean it as a friend, as a brother or sister, and as a Christian striving to love one's neighbor as the Bible directs us to do. That love very well may need to be what we sometimes call "tough love," that is "speaking the truth in love" (Ephesians 5:15) to people who may not appreciate it at the time but need to hear it nonetheless because it is in their best interest. It's this kind of love with which loving parents discipline their children, and with which God disciplines us as His children because He loves us (see Proverbs 3:12 and Hebrews 12:6). Certainly God calls us all to love our neighbor as ourselves (Leviticus 19:18, Mark 12:31, etc.), but we love our neighbor within the appropriate and particular parameters that God has given for our love to be expressed. So it's not really a matter of "who you love" as much as it is "how you love." Loving my neighbor does not mean coveting or committing adultery with my neighbor. Our loving God out of His love for us wants the "marriage bed" (Hebrews 13:4) honored by all and kept undefiled by devoting our sexual expression to the marriage context and defining marriage as Jesus does (Mark 10:6-9).

Far better than saying "love is love" we should say, as the Bible does, "God is love" (1 John 4:16) and then let God define what love is and how it is to be expressed in the various contexts of this life that He has given us. When we do, it will often surprise us. God demonstrated His great love for us by loving us even while we were yet sinners and His enemies (see Romans 5:8-11). It's been said that Lutherans love Lent, and that's no doubt because we see God's love in the cross of Jesus. "In this is love, not that we have loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins" (1 John 4:10). I don't know if you love this Lenten hymn or not, but it says it well: "My song is love unknown, my Savior's love to me; love to the loveless shown, that they might lovely be" (Samuel Crossman: 1623-1683). May the Lord bless our Lent, and bless our love for Him and each other in response to His indescribable love for us.


The Power of Stories

If you're a grandparent, you naturally want to provide love and support to your grandchildren. And if you're a Christian grandparent, you no doubt have an even higher priority of helping your grandchildren develop a biblical worldview.

But how can you effectively teach a biblical worldview to your grandchildren in today's noisy environment, with its constant bombardment of unbiblical information and images from social media, TV, movies, video games, and the internet?

One answer is through stories. Jesus himself taught using parables. You likewise can use stories to effectively teach biblical truth.



Share your personal journey of faith

One story you certainly will want to tell is the story of your personal journey of faith. Your grandchildren will be eager to hear about how you came to know Jesus Christ as your Savior and Lord. They will be encouraged to learn how God has faithfully guided, protected, and provided for you as you have walked with him over the years.

Share Bible stories

Of course, you will want to make God's Word the central focus of your story times with your grandchildren. Their faith will be strengthened as you read together the stories of Joseph, Jacob, Moses, Esther, Ruth, Abraham, Paul, and other leading Bible figures. Of utmost importance, you'll want to read the story of Jesus as well as discuss the stories He told.

Share Good Christian Books

Consider augmenting Bible stories by reading together some of the many good Christian children's books that are available. You can also use books that are not overtly Christian to teach biblical truths.

For example, while reading the well-known children's book *Goodnight Moon*, talk with your grandchildren about the vastness of the universe that God has created. Use a concordance to look up relevant Scripture. If you look up the word "stars", for instance, one of several verses highlighted will be Psalm 147:4, which says that God calls each of the stars by name. Looking up the word "heavens" will point you to passages like Psalms 136:1-9, which tells us to give thanks to the Lord, who made the moon and the stars to rule over the night.

Relating Scripture to the stories you read will enlarge your grandchildren's universe beyond a wonderful story to an even more wonderful God.

Lead a Time of Discussion

After reading a story aloud with your grandchildren, ask open-ended questions, such as, "Which characters are most like and unlike you? Why do you think the characters made the choices they did? What would you have done if you had been in their situation? What can we learn from this story?"

Further deepen the learning experience by relating the story to actual life experiences. For example, if the story focuses on perseverance, share about times when you persevered to achieve a goal. If the story is about inappropriate anger or jealousy, point out how each of us has a sin nature, and perhaps discuss the story of Cain and Abel. Invite your grandchildren to share their personal experiences, as well.

This type of personal interaction will enrich learning and create fond memories.



Do you do daily devotions? If not, would you like to learn how? This article has some ideas for the how, where, and when of doing daily devotions along with why they are so important. I've also included some examples of getting started and making them a regular part of your routine.

Daily Spiritual Exercise is as Important as Physical Exercise

Just as physical exercise increases our strength and endurance as well as promotes overall health, so does spiritual exercise. When we intentionally give our attention to God and take time away from our other activities to spend time with him, our souls become stronger as they are rooted in God's promises. We are then ready to take on anything that comes our way throughout the rest of the day. You may not see a difference after just one day of devotional time, but just like exercise, you'll see the impact over the long run.

Devotions are a Form of Worship

Daily devotions are worship. When you take time to sit with just God and intentionally get to know Him through His word and your conversation with Him, you are honoring him with your worship. When you take time every day to "Be still, and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10), you worship Him, and your daily devotions will grow deeper and more meaningful since relationship – knowing someone well – helps your love for them to increase.

Devotions Pay Off in Times of Need

Daily devotionals are a direct way to "store up treasures in heaven" (Matthew 6:19-20). When your heart starts absorbing eternal truths that point you to heaven, you are prepared for anything life hands you (Ephesians 6:10-17)!

When the devil tries to lie to you, you'll catch on more quickly because you have daily stored up God's truth in your heart (John 8:32)

Daily devotions lead to trusting God more and experiencing more of His peace. He holds the whole world in His hands, and He gives peace that passes understanding (Psalm 46; Philippians 4:7).

If you struggle with anxiety that keeps you up at night, doing your Bible reading right before bed will help you sleep soundly. As you are reminded that God loves you, you'll experience freedom from anxiety (John 8:32).

Flexible Options for Daily Devotions

Devotional time doesn't have to be using a devotional article or book. It could be just you and your Bible and maybe worship music playing softly in the background. It can be any combination of many things.

A devotional book to guide you each day One verse a day and *think* about (meditate on) Committing a verse to memory Journaling about a verse

You don't have to do the same thing every day, either. Maybe one day of devotional time will simply be worship and prayer and another will be going through a daily Bible reading plan like the many offered on the You Version Bible App. Whatever you choose, be intentional about doing it daily.

If you miss a day, don't guilt-trip yourself! Satan loves to make us feel condemned and guilty. Refuse to let him do that. If you struggle with consistently spending time with the Lord, ask another believer to keep you accountable. And remember, sticking with something for at least 21 days usually turns it into a habit.

Ideas and Suggestions

For the next several months, this article will present ideas for how to establish regular spiritual exercise in your life. I'll offer some suggestions that work well for other people as well as some you could do with your spouse to bring you closer to each other and God.

To begin, I will explain how I practice scripture writing. Every morning around 10:00, I follow a list prepared by

Sweet Blessings (swtblessings.com), though you can find your own elsewhere on the Internet. This list gives me a monthly topic that all the scripture for that month relate to. For example, January's topic is "Open my eyes that I may see wonderful things in your law" (Psalm 119:18). (If anyone is interested, I can provide a copy of a year's worth of topics and verses.)

There is a different set of verses to write and think about every day, all pertaining to the topic for the month. I follow my scripture writing with a daily devotion from "Wisdom for Each Day" by Billy Graham. Most days, it takes me 20 minutes to complete my devotions and scripture writing. If I miss a day, I catch up within the next couple of days; if I'm on vacation, I may adjust my schedule so I can complete them in private.





WANT TO GO W-A-A-A-Y UP NORTH?

When you live in Michigan, there are always debates as to what is really "Up North." Here in Kalamazoo county, we don't see ourselves as up north but we are for those in Indiana. Cadillac, Michigan is seen by many as the gate way to the north, but people in the UP would beg to differ. Well, when you're in Lac Brochet, Manitoba, Canada, even the upper peninsula of Michigan is way down south! Lac Brochet is in the upper northwestern recesses of Manitoba about the same latitude as Juneau, Alaska and about 1,700 miles north of us in southwest Michigan. We usually fly from Kalamazoo to Minneapolis to Winnipeg to Thompson to Lac Brochet, each leg in separate airplanes that get progressively smaller. We stay in the church parsonage, visit with adults and play with children, put on a week long Bible school for young kids, and conduct some Bible studies in the evening for men, for women, and for teens. We usually eat our meals together in the parsonage and are often treated to local fresh fish and perhaps caribou. We do a some hiking and exploring, maybe a little fishing, and have even seen bears and the northern lights. It's a unique adventure can be rather exhausting but always very gratifying, especially as we share the love of Jesus with the Dene First Nations people and receive it back from them too. Does this sound like something you would like to do, or to support? Right now we are activity seeking those who would join the travel team as well as the financial contributions that make it possible for anyone to go whom the Lord is leading into this special mission experience. PROPOSED RESOLUTION: AFGHAN REFUGEE MINISTRY

The following information is presented for prayer and discussion at the upcoming Town Hall meeting (2/12), and consideration at the Voters' Assembly (2/26).

WHEREAS St. Michael Lutheran Church has been identified by People of the Book Lutheran Outreach (POBLO) and the Michigan District of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod as well suited to partner with them in ministering to refugees from Afghanistan, many of whom have already become Christians and have now settled into the Kalamazoo area, and

WHEREAS POBLO is a mission society of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod and has vast experience and success in partnering with congregations and deploying ethnic missionaries from many different cultures and backgrounds to work with immigrant and refugee populations, especially from south Asia, and

WHEREAS similar partnerships between POBLO and local congregations in reaching out to immigrant and refugees populations has proven to be a blessing to those congregations by adding new faces to worship, Sunday School, Bible class, and church membership, and by greatly enhancing the congregation's knowledge, skills, and relationships, and

WHEREAS POBLO has identified and agreed to train, catechize, and closely monitor a local Afghan Christian man named Amanullah Ahmed Zai who has expressed a strong desire to become a Lutheran pastor and to serve the Afghan refugees in our area, and


WHEREAS POBLO has promised to partner with us in providing Amanullah Ahmed Zai with on-site field training and supervision, including with Rev. Vincent Iqbal serving as his local pastoral supervisor/mentor, and also to pay his Amanullah's monthly salary and benefits, and

WHEREAS the Michigan District assures us that they will stand with and between POBLO and St. Michael Lutheran Church to help communicate the mission to other congregations in order to encourage their financial and material support of this mission, and will themselves provide at least \$20,000 of the \$28,000 of annual program costs, now therefore be it

RESOLVED that we agree to work with POBLO, Amanullah Ahmed Zai, and the Michigan District in developing a ministry plan that includes measurable goals for monthly evaluation and respectful use of our facilities for this ministry within our policies and guidelines for appropriate property utilization, and be in further

RESOLVED that St. Michael Lutheran Church enter into this Afghan mission partnership with POBLO and with their local missionary-in-training (Amanullah Ahmed Zai), providing Spiritual support for him in his work, and praying for him and his family, and be it finally

RESOLVED that St. Michael Lutheran Church establish a designated fund (administered by our Board of Evangelism and Missions) from which we will provide \$5,000 of the \$28,000 annual program cost with the understanding that in addition to the contribution from the Michigan District other congregations will also provide at least \$3,000 toward the costs of the program.

You are not the most important person. Hopefully your parents/guardians taught you this very important lesson, and, by God's grace, you are still able to put this truth into practice. Jesus loves you! You are a precious creature of God. And yet, nonetheless, you are not the most important person.

This truth (believe it or not) flies in the face of what we are told every single day of our lives. We are sold this lie: you are THE MOST IMPORTANT person, and whatever you want, you can and should get, no matter the cost and no matter who else is harmed in the process. If someone in your life is being "toxic", get rid of them. If someone in your family is hurting you, disown them. If you are being slowed down or hindered in any way, do what you must to achieve your ambitions.

This is not the way of Christ. Jesus is better than you in every single way. Jesus IS better than you and me, and could easily demand us to either shape up or ship out. Yet that is not the way of Christ. In love, Jesus humbled Himself. Jesus did not insist upon His own way, but chose to serve, to listen, to become weak, and to die for us.

Now that you belong to Christ, you serve God and your neighbors. You have given away your own desires and even needs in order to serve others. One awesome example of this is our life as a congregation together. When we gather as Christians on the weekend, how can you serve better and more faithfully for the good of your fellow members? When you come to Confirmation class, how can you better learn and respect your fellow classmates and teachers? When you head home... how can you better love your own family?

God loves you. He chose you even before you had any inkling to serve Him. And now that you do belong to Him, you and I can act like it. Love and serve! Volunteer, even for those events that don't particularly interest you, or that might seem "inconvenient".

God bless us as we live together as His body, as His people, under His humble leadership and gentle love.
