### "For ALL THE SAINTS"

The story goes that a little boy and his dad were coming out of church one Sunday morning and noticed a plaque on the wall that listed the names of members of the congregation who were in our nation's military and killed in the line of duty. The little boy asked his dad why the names were on the plaque and his dad replied, "these are our members who died in the service." The boy thought for a moment and then asked his dad, "was that at the 8:30 or 11:00 service?"

During my time at St. Michael, we've not had anyone die in the worship service, but we have had some people faint and have had to call 911 on a few occasions. But the reality is, people who come to church tend to live longer than those who don't. As of the 2020 US census, the average life expectancy of an American is about 77. But several years ago, the Washington Post reported that a major study of church attendance and mortality found that people who attend church every week live an average of seven years longer than people who never attend worship services. A more recent study found that regular church attenders live on average an extra three years. Either way, it's safe to say that people who go to church tend to live longer than those who don't.

At the end of last week, 91 year old Pastor Allan and I conducted the funeral of a 95 year old woman. Her son's father-in-law was at the funeral, too. He is the pastor who recruited me to Concordia Ann Arbor when I was a kid in Florida. He is 96. At the end of September, I conducted a funeral for a 96 year old, and his widow who is in her mid-90s is in our pews every Sunday. In fact, in our pews this month will be several faithful worshipers who are over 90 years old. My step-father-in-law who worships with us faithfully is 90, and on November 14 my mother (who is down in Florida) will turn 94. In this month of November, Pastor Allan and I will be making home visits on about ten of our members in their 90s. Actually, one is already 100. I would say that during my time at St. Michael I've ministered to about a half a dozen people who were centenarians.

As we celebrate all the saints on All Saints Day, let's remember not just the saints of old, but the old saints who are yet in our congregation and worshiping with us regularly. Sadly, in our culture we often don't value and appreciate our elders like other cultures might. But the Bible surely encourages us to revere old people. God says: "You shall stand up before the gray head and honor the face of an old man" (Leviticus 19:32) and "Gray hair is a crown of glory; it is gained in a righteous life" (Proverbs 16:31). The fourth commandment to "honor your father and your mother" continues to apply to every one of us all throughout our life, and it actually comes with the promise of long life as well (Exodus 20:12).

The Church of our Lord Jesus Christ is and always should be a place where old people are honored, listened to, and learned from. The Church is multigenerational and the place where people of all ages come together to bless and serve one another, and to join together in praising and glorifying God: "Young men and maidens together, old men and children!" (Psalm 148:12). There's hardly a congregation on earth that is not wishing that they had more young people, for we know that Christianity is always just one generation away from extinction. But as much as we want and need to reach out to young people in our community, let us also celebrate the older people that we have among us. Who knows, perhaps the presence of vibrant old people in our fellowship will be part of the draw for younger people to want to be in God's family, too.

### A Dress Rehearsal for Living in Communion with God

"For some reason, people tend to confuse the means with the actual goal. In the beginning, you tend to think that God really cares about your exact posture, the exact day of the week for public prayer, the authorship and wordings of your prayers, and other such things.

Once your life has become a constant communion, you know that all the techniques, formulas, sacraments, and practices were just a dress rehearsal for the real thing—life itself. A constant intentional prayer. Your conscious and loving existence gives glory to God."

(Falling Upward: A Spirituality for the Two Halves of Life ,Richard Rohr)

The image of the congregation's worship as a dress rehearsal for living a life in constant communion with God may not be the only image that describes worship, but it adds another layer of understanding for worshipers of all ages.

As we seek to include children in the congregation's worship it reminds us that the goal is not that they behave or even that they know enough of the songs and prayers to participate at least a little. The goal is that they acquire and practice skills for living in relationship with God every day.

Our task is to help them adopt praise, thanksgiving, confession and accepting forgiveness, listening for God, sharing our concerns with God, remembering what we know to be true and making commitments to live accordingly as skills for living every day.

That means our task is to help them grasp not just what we do in worship, but what it leads us to do every day. We need to help them see that just as they can thank God with songs and prayers in the sanctuary, they can go through every day with grateful hearts. Likewise, if they can confess and be forgiven in the sanctuary, they just might be able to do it in the back seat of the van, the locker room, or the lunch room. Over time the patterns they learn in the sanctuary can become the patterns of their lives. So we are not just inviting them to worship, we are rehearsing them into the Christian life. Not easy - but a worthy goal to ponder.



### THE PRAYER OF FAITH

"Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well? The Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven. Therefore, confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of the righteous person is powerful and effective." James 5:13-16

Essentially James is asking, "Is any among you afflicted?" This can mean anything, really: sickness, bereavement, disappointment, persecution, loss of health or property, etc. The word used for afflicted refers to suffering evil of any kind for any reason. God knows what you are going through, and he can remove the source of your sorrow. It doesn't matter what form your sorrow takes. If you are afflicted, James says, the answer is prayer.

It is a privilege to go to God in prayer. Whatever you are struggling with – poor health, lost friends and family, lost property, disappointments, danger, death – only God truly understands and will be with you through any difficult time. Remember, though, that God's presence comes in many forms. From a sense of peace while praying or when reading the Bible to a kind word from a friend or a hug from a family member, God comes to us in many and varied ways to let us know we are not alone.

James also says, "Is anyone happy?" This means to be merry, free from trouble, or cheerful. If so, he encourages, "Let them sing songs of praise." When we are happy, we are to celebrate our peace of mind and joyful state. Not only does this express gratitude to God, but it also shows others the joy that living for God brings.

It is also important to pray and thank God when he allows a time of peace for us to recuperate and regenerate. It is important to learn about how to pray in the various seasons of life. As we do, our devotion grows and we more consistently rely on God to build his kingdom in our lives, the church, and the world.



James is not just imploring believers to pray for one another. He is also telling us to share our burdens with each another. Sometimes our prayer needs are visible and obvious. However, much of the time, others do not know what is going on in our lives and how we need prayer. This is why spending time regularly with other believers is so important. Building these relationships gives opportunity and connection that encourages sharing that can lead to prayer that heals.

At St. Michaels, we are blessed to have many prayer warriors! There are people willing to pray with you anytime and for any reason. They will pray for you while you are going through a difficult situation, and they will spend time with you to build a relationship that God uses to help get you through the especially tough times. Decide today to reach out to someone to have them pray with you. Or, maybe, simply begin a new connection with a simple "hello." Either way, know that there are many in your church family ready to be used by God in powerful and effective ways in your life.

### REMEMBERING YOUR LOVED ONE THIS HOLIDAY SEASON

The holidays can be "hollow days" for those who are grieving the loss of a loved one. As poet Edna St. Vincent Millay wrote, "the presence of that absence is everywhere" -especially for those experiencing their first Thanksgiving or Christmas after a death.

Thus, it can be helpful to **begin now** – before Advent and other traditions begin – to think about and plan for how you will deal with the holidays this year. Here are some suggestions from *"Experiencing Grief,"* a booklet in the Stephen Ministries series *Journeying through Grief*.



- Anticipate that the holidays will probably be sad and emotional no matter what you do. That is okay. Do not allow yourself or others to pressure you to "be merry." Instead, embrace Advent in all its fullness as a season of waiting.
- *Focus only on how to make it through <u>this</u> holiday.* It doesn't have to be like the previous ones. And whatever you do (or don't) experience should not affect future ones. Set realistic expectations for yourself and allow this year to be unique.
- *Don't be afraid to change some traditions.* Forego potential stressors that you don't feel up to doing, such as cooking a big Christmas dinner. This New Year's Eve might be better staying in than going out.
- *Don't be afraid to keep some traditions.* You may find comfort and security in keeping certain traditions the same, especially if they remind you of your loved one. Despite the temptation, avoid "canceling" the holiday.
- *Get together with others who are grieving.* This is not a good time to isolate yourself. Try to plan a social activity with others who understand what you are going through.
- *Plan a way to remember your loved one.* There are many meaningful ways that you can allow the one who has died to be included in the holiday. You can put their favorite dish on the menu or play holiday songs that remind you of them or light a candle. Let family and friends know that it is okay for them to talk about your loved one.
- *It's okay to smile and laugh if you want to.* It's possible that you will feel conflicting emotions all at once. And while the holidays will never be the same, things can be different and still be happy.
- *Finally, do not forget Stephen Ministry*. Stephen Ministers meet one-on-one with those needing confidential support and Christ-centered care. To request a Stephen Minister, contact a Stephen Leader such as Dana Naumann at 269-808-7832.

Mike said to Greg, "All my life I have been comparing myself to others, always believing that everyone else is more blessed than I. I am not a billionaire, but I was actually quite overwhelmed to see the combined value of our house, our cottage, our paid-up life insurance and our retirement accounts. I usually just look at things one at a time. Combined together, I realize that I have been underestimating what God has been doing in our lives. Now I am asking the question, 'I wonder what God wants us to do with all of this?' I have this feeling that it includes more than just inheritance to the kids, as they are all doing quite well."

Greg responded, "Mike this is awesome. With your new-found perspective, I think your estate planning is going to be a lot of fun. Are you thinking about leaving a gift to ministry?"

Mike responded, "I sure am. Every time I see the kids from our Lutheran School in worship, I am so glad they are learning about Jesus. I want to help provide scholarships so more kids can come in the future."

While a small group of women do the physical work of planning, cutting, sewing, and ironing, none of it would happen without contributions from the congregation. So thank you for again supporting this ministry with your donations of clean queen or king sheets, 100% cotton fabric and cash. As these quilts are distributed, please pray that the recipients will come to know Jesus and feel His arms around them as they snuggle in the warmth of a quilt.

### Lutheran World Relief Gathering a Success!

Our annual Lutheran World Relief collection resulted in a total of 540 boxes from at least 25 various churches in Southwest Michigan. This was done in spite of the rain this year!

Thanks to receiving a number of grants from **Thrivent Financial**, St Michael Church and School was able to donate Baby Care Kits, School Bags, Hygiene Kits, and Quilts. These were in 161 of the boxes on the trailer. The totals received from all the churches were:

Quilts: 166 boxes Hygiene Kits: 124 boxes Sewing Kits: 8 boxes School Bags: 153 boxes Baby Care Kits: 89 boxes

I want to extend sincere thanks to all of the year-long efforts of Michele Ryan in collecting, storing, organizing, and assembly of the donations. She has led this effort for 20 years now!
