

LAW AND GOSPEL

Lutherans are not good at everything, but we are really good at the proper distinction between "Law" and "Gospel." In fact, the founder of our Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, C.F.W. Walther, wrote a landmark book with that very title (at least in English, anyway) (https://www.cph.org/law-andgospel-how-to-read-and-apply-the-bible). "Law" and "Gospel" are two distinctive teachings found all throughout the Bible, indeed in virtually every verse. A simple definition of the "Law" is anything and everything that God tells us that He wants us to do for Him (and for our neighbor). A simple definition of the "Gospel" is anything and everything that God has done and continues to do for us without any merit or worthiness in us (especially the free forgiveness that comes entirely on account of the perfect sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the cross).

The "Law" is good in that it tells us God's will and desire. But the "Law" is also bad in that it never acquits us or justifies us, but always accuses us and always condemns us because we are never able to keep it perfectly as God demands. While these two biblical doctrines are very distinct, and even seem to be contradictory of one another, they are both true at the same time. The "Gospel" does not water down or soften the "Law." Instead, the "Gospel" fulfills and satisfies the "Law."

The challenge comes when the distinctiveness of these two doctrines gets blurred and when "Law" and "Gospel" get mixed together. If you add the "Gospel" to the "Law," in an attempt to soften the "Law" it ceases to be the "Law." For example, some might say that the 10 Commandments no longer apply to us because we are forgiven of our sins. But forgiveness doesn't change the "Law;" what it does is remove our liability and the just punishment for breaking God's commands. Worse still, if we add the "Law" to the "Gospel" it robs the "Gospel" of its comforting and saving power. For example, some would acknowledge that Jesus' death and resurrection earned the forgiveness of our sins, but then they also believe that it is still required of us to do some work of the "Law" in order to access that forgiveness that Christ earned for us. It is as if Christ's saving work stored up merit before God, but we can't access that merit without some effort on our part. In other words, we still have to merit the merit of Christ by our good works.

The 10 Commandments themselves, the epitome of the "Law," can also be misunderstood if we're not clear on the "Gospel." You see, the 10 Commandments, especially as Martin Luther explains them in the Small Catechism, often have both a negative and positive aspect to them. For example, with the 5th Commandment ("you shall not murder"), Luther explains it by saying: "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body, but help and support him in every physical need." Notice there is the negative prohibition in the commandment (i.e., "do not hurt or harm our neighbor), but there is also the positive aspect of the commandment (i.e., "help and support him in every physical need). But it would surely be a mistake to label the negative prohibition in the commandment as "Law" (i.e., what not to do) and the positive aspect of it (i.e., what to do) as "Gospel." The fact is, both the positive negative and aspects commandment are "Law" and they always accuse and condemn, especially when we also take into consideration the "spirit" of the law (i.e., wishing someone were dead, etc.). No, the "Gospel" with regard to the 5th commandment is that Jesus was murdered for us and that His innocent suffering and death on the cross are the sufficient sacrifice and full payment for all our sins, even the sin of murder, and that we receive His forgiveness by faith alone (simply believing it). That may seem like letting people off too easily, but the "Gospel" is just that simple.

Someone asked me the other day if a murderer can be saved. After pointing out to them that Moses, King David, and St. Paul were all murderers, I reminded them that our salvation is not the result of the fact that we managed to avoid doing a particular sin (i.e., keeping the Law), but rather our salvation is entirely based on what Jesus did for us and that His sacrifice is entirely sufficient to pay for all sin, even the worst of sin (i.e., the Gospel). If this raises concern that people will just get away with murder, we don't address that concern by adding the "Law" to the "Gospel," but rather we say what the Bible says: "Are we to continue in sin that grace may abound? By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it? Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore

with Him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:1-4).

So yes, the "Gospel" gives us the forgiveness of sin, but it does not give us a license to sin. When Jesus said to the woman caught in adultery "neither do I condemn you," He also said to her "go and sin no more" (John 8:11). If the "Gospel" seems too easy, we can't put teeth in it by adding the "Law" to it. But we can rest assured that the "Gospel" has the power to change us, so that we will no longer want

to sin (even though we will always struggle with sin), but we will want to live for God and His will. As St. Peter put it: "(Jesus) Himself bore our sins in His body on the tree, so that we might die to sin and live to righteousness" (I Peter 2:24). You can't make the "Law" more tolerable by softening it with the "Gospel," and you can't make the "Gospel" less susceptible to abuse by adding the "Law" to it. No, we let the "Law" and the "Gospel" be what they are, distinct from one another, and yet related to each other in an important and wonderful way, to the glory of God.



St. Michael Lutheran School began in 2001. Each year a new grade level was added until the first middle school class began at the start of the 2009-2010 school year. Due to smaller class sizes, our 7th and 8th grades have been combined

using an alternating curriculum, so that when students graduate from the 8th grade, they will have met all of the state requirements and be amply prepared for high school.

With the continued growth of our school, we are currently working on plans to expand the middle school to include stand-alone classrooms for both 7th & 8th grades beginning in the fall of 2025. This will mark the first time we will have stand-alone classes K-8. This change will accommodate current and future growth in our program. We will also convert and outfit a classroom to serve as a STEM lab. Our plan is to departmentalize instruction in grades 6-8 and provide an environment that will better prepare students for a high school experience. There will be more information to share over the next few months as preparation and subsequent site changes are made to accommodate this new plan.


NEW RESOURCES AVAILABLE!!

AT PEACE IN ANY STORM

"God is our refuge and strength, always ready to help in time of trouble. So, we will not fear when earthquakes come and the mountains crumble into the sea. Let the oceans roar and foam. Let the mountains tremble as the waters surge! Psalm 46:1-3



Imagine that you are flying in an airplane and, let's say, a door pops off! The yellow silicone cups (oxygen masks) come down and you must make an immediate decision about whose oxygen mask you fasten first.

The answer is: you should put your own mask on first or you will not be able to help anyone else if you pass out.

This is a good example of the person who finds it difficult to trust God amid personal battles. Instead of turning to God (or the oxygen mask) this person becomes fearful, making it more difficult to receive the help God wants to send. They tend to worry and fret about what they should be doing or how they should handle this situation but what they are really doing is struggling against letting go and letting God take care of them.

We allow ourselves to indulge in doubts and fears, and consequently we are plunged into darkness, and turmoil and cannot find peace. Which is exactly what we need for the healing process to complete its work.

The next time you are faced with a challenge that makes your knees shake and your heart lurch, think of yourself as the person on that airplane. First put on your oxygen mask and breath in God's grace, calm yourself in His presence and ask for His guidance so you will know how to meet the challenges at hand.

While you pray, remind yourself that the spiritual struggles you face probably won't be overcome in an instant. Instead, they require that you continually surrender, trust in Christ for all that troubles you, and stand in the faith he gives you.

Also, remember you are never alone! Call a prayer warrior to be with you through your struggles.



TREASURE AUDIO BIBLES UPDATE

In November of 2021 St. Michael Lutheran Church and School joined together with an organization called World Mission (recently renamed Unknown Nations) to raise money to purchase *Treasure* solar-powered audio Bibles to be shared with unreached people groups throughout the world.

Through the generosity of many church members and the creative and energetic efforts of many students, we raised an unprecedented amount of \$7,367.56, which allowed Unknown Nations to purchase 184 *Treasures*. Because each solar-powered *Treasure* is estimated to reach up to 144 people (because they listen in groups), that amazing effort provided the gospel message to an estimated 24,496 people who had never heard the name of Jesus before. (In 2018 we raised \$606.05, which purchased 15 *Treasures* and reached an estimated 2,181 people.)

Unknown Nations continues to work diligently to get the gospel message to the ears of unreached people groups. The following is the testimony of two families who were affected by hearing God's Word for the first time via a *Treasure* audio Bible just this past month. Because studies show that up to 70% of these unreached people are oral learners, who are either illiterate or prefer to learn orally, the *Treasure* continues to be a very powerful tool, especially with its availability in over 6,000 dialects.

We will be providing the opportunity to once again partner with SMLS students and Unknown Nations in September of 2024! More details will be forthcoming as that timeframe gets closer. In the meantime, please pray for this upcoming campaign, asking God to use St. Michael mightily in expanding His kingdom and sharing His message of salvation with many who have not yet heard. The first testimony involves a young man who had heart disease. He had spent all of his money on doctors and medicine. One day, this young man heard his neighbor playing his Treasure audio Bible and was attracted by the words coming from the device. He went near to listen, and while he stood there for 10 minutes a peace came over his mind.

As he was listening, he learned that "the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." Then he started thinking, I'm dying from heart disease... and there's a gift of eternal life. So why should I not get behind Jesus Christ? This young man fully gave his life to Jesus. He has also been completely healed from the heart disease. Praise the Lord!

The second testimony came from the man pictured above. He shared through a translator, "When I was unknown to Jesus, my life and my full family's life was in very bad condition. No way to live, no food, no clothes, and life was fully in sin. When the pastor introduced us to Jesus, he gave us one yellow device. I and my family listened and realized that Jesus is the only way to eternal life and the Prince of Peace. We all family members dedicated ourselves in the hand of Jesus and start following Jesus."

Please pray for these new believers as they are still very young in the Lord. Pray that the Holy Spirit would keep them safe and strengthen them day by day. Please also lift up our indigenous leaders who are risking their lives to share the gospel in this closed country. Ask God for supernatural boldness and protection as they walk forward in their ministry.
