GOD'S WORD FINDS YOU!

One of the most depressing days of the year for me is when we put our Christmas tree away for another year, carefully wrapping and packing fragile Christmas ornaments and hauling heavy boxes back down the basement. But one bright spot about this task is rediscovering treasured ornaments that have spent weeks near the back of the tree. Some were made by our children years ago, some are ornaments that we inherited from our families growing up. During the sad process of un-Christmas'ing our living room, it's nice to see and hold precious memories one more time.

2 Kings 22 features the prophet Hilkiah and King Josiah rediscovering the lost treasure of the Word of God that had been stored away in a forgotten corner of the temple. However, when this lost gem was found again, joy was not what filled the hearts of the King and his people. Instead, 22:11 tells us, "when the King heard the words of the Book of the Law, he tore his clothes." King Josiah found that he and his forbears had not been obeying God's Word, and God's righteous wrath had been kindling against them for years now.

In response to this horrible discovery, King Josiah "inquires of the Lord", praying for guidance. He then renews the covenant with the Lord by reading the entire Law out loud to the people. Nationwide cleansing follows this, including the smashing of false idols and temples and the banishment of false prophets. Finally, the Passover is restored and observed once again.

When God's Word comes into our lives, it brings about change. Recognition of our sin and repentance takes place. God's Holy Spirit brings about renewal in our lives and in our hearts, turning our focus back upon His mercy and love. If you've been tracking with our "reading the Bible in a year" plan(s), you may have noticed similar changes in your own life. When confronted by the

Word of God, we come face to face with the fact that we are, indeed, sinners. We daily fall short of the glory of God, and are justified freely by His grace.

Thanks be to God that He doesn't forget us! May we, like Josiah, continue to read and hear His Word that promises life, forgiveness, and a renewed spirit! If you've missed a few days (or years) reading and resting in God's Word, today is a new day! Be encouraged to know that God doesn't forget you, and He is drawing you back to Himself by His Holy Spirit through His Word. God loves you, and has life and joy waiting for you in His promises in Scripture.

Open up your Bible today, and see once again just how merciful and mighty your Lord is.

Treasure Audio Bibles Mission Focus

During the month of February St. Michael Lutheran School students will be raising money to provide *Treasure* solar-powered audio Bibles to unreached people groups throughout the world through an organization called Unknown Nations.

Unknown Nations' ministry is focused on the "10/40 window," which includes North Africa, the Middle East and Asia between 10 and 40 degrees north latitude (also referred to as "The Resistance Belt"). This region houses the world's largest Muslim, Hindu, and Buddhist populations. Studies show that up to 70% of these people are oral learners, who are either illiterate or prefer to learn orally, which is why the *Treasure* is such a powerful tool, especially with its availability in over 6,000 dialects.

In the 2023-24 fiscal year, Unknown Nations distributed 88,525 *Treasures*. Audio Bibles are not limited to individual audiences, but can impact listening groups ranging in numbers, which in turn lead to vast numbers of people accepting Jesus and becoming baptized members of the family of God.

Here's where you come in...

St. Michael Lutheran School students are asking church members and families to prayerfully consider joining them in filling an Unknown Nations *Change Your World* box with loose change and dollars throughout the month of February. Each filled box ideally turns into one *Treasure* audio Bible. (*CYW* boxes will be available on a display table in the narthex.) The cost of one *Treasure* is \$40, and an additional \$10 delivers it to its destination.

In lieu of a filled CYW box, checks of any amount, made payable to St. Michael Lutheran School, are welcome! Filled CYW boxes, checks and cash may be dropped off in the school office or given to Greg or Wendy Johnson by Sunday, March 2.



WORSHIP

THE SHARING OF CHRIST'S PEACE

One of the most meaningful parts of the service is when we Share the Peace. It's more than just saying "how are you doing?" or shaking hands (or fist bumps). It's a moment where we intentionally share Jesus' peace with each other, showing that we're united in His love and forgiveness.

Sharing the peace of God with each other has deep roots in Scripture. In John 14:27, Jesus says, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you." This isn't just about avoiding arguments — it's the peace that comes from being right with God and each other. Jesus also says in Matthew 5:23-24, that if we're offering a gift at the altar but remember we have something against someone, we should go and make peace first. It shows how important reconciling with one another is to God, especially when we come to worship Him.

When we share the peace, we're not just saying "hi." We're remembering the peace that Jesus brought us through His death and resurrection. The peace we give each other is a sign of the peace we've already received from God. It's also a reminder that, as the church, we're all united in Christ, no matter where we come from or what we've been through.

The Sharing of the Peace is also an opportunity to reflect and check ourselves. It's a time to think about any unresolved issues we have with others. When we offer peace to someone, it's not just a polite gesture—it's a chance to live out the forgiveness and grace God has given us. It challenges us to show that peace in our everyday relationships too, not just on Sunday.

Sharing the peace with one another is a blessing to us as a church family together. It's a reminder that we're not just individuals who happen to be in the same place. We're the body of Christ, united. When we share peace, we're saying, "I'm here for you, I want to live in love and harmony with you," even when we don't always see eye to eye.

The Sharing of the Peace is more than just a pleasant moment together. It's a powerful part of worship that reminds us of the peace Jesus gives us. It gives us a chance to reflect on our relationships with God and others, to ask for forgiveness if we need to, and to commit to living in peace. It's a reminder of God's grace and helps build a deeper sense of community in the church.

While we highly value people of every age, we are especially excited about our population of young families, many of whom come into our congregation through our Christian education programs for children.

Luke 18:15-17)

WANGERIN ON PRAYER

Simply put, prayer is communication.

We talk with God, not just to him. God talks with us too, causing a circle to be whole and closed between us.

Complexly, the complete prayer is made up of four acts, four discrete parts, two of which are ours, two of which are God's. The parts may seem separated one from another by time or by the different nature of the acts;



yet often all four acts occur in such swift succession that the complete prayer is revealed as a single, unbroken event. And so it is communication:

First, we speak. while second, God listens Third, God speaks,

while fourth, we listen

If we initiate the first act, God will respond with the second. That is sure and certain. So is the third act absolutely certain to follow the first two, because God's love promises to speak to us by a Word.

But if we have never learned the fourth, if we are too impatient to perform the fourth act, too demanding and unsubmissive to watch and to wait upon the Lord, then we will never know that the second and the third acts have been accomplished. Without our truly listening, prayer will seem to have failed because communication, remaining incomplete, did in fact fail. The circle stayed broken, and love was left unknown.

Learn the circle. Trust in God to listen and to speak, and our own listening will follow as easily as the eyes of a child follow their father – in whom is all their good.

YOU DON'T HAVE TO READ THE BIBLE 50 TIMES IN 2025 (but finishing it once would be great)

A 96-year-old pastor in Georgia has read the entire Bible more than 1,000 times, according to a story featured in December on the television program The 700 Club.

Pastor Shelby Summerland says he was inspired many years ago by 19th century evangelist George Müller's 200 readings of the Bible. Summerland surpassed Müller in only four years – and kept going. Reading at least two hours daily, he says he can finish the Bible every six days, or 50 times a year.

Summerland's pace is six times faster than the average Bible reader, who needs 65 to 75 hours to read all of God's Word. Nevertheless, compared to him, taking a year to read the Bible feels almost leisurely. It requires 12 minutes each day. (Summerland advises reading three chapters daily and seven chapters on Sundays.)

Here at St. Michael, we would like you to open your Bible more often – ideally as a daily habit in 2025. Our special emphasis is called 66:1, because we also want to encourage you to read through the entire Bible (all 66 books) in a single year. Even though it's already February, it's never too late to begin.

How you do it is entirely up to you. Find a time of day that fits your schedule. Use a reading plan that we provide or choose one that you like better. Skip reading and instead listen using audio Bible apps, websites, or other media players.

What's most important is to be intentional about taking in God's Word every day. The Scriptures themselves extol their value and power

(see <u>2 Timothy 3:16</u>, <u>Romans 15:4</u>, <u>Mark 13:31</u>, and <u>Matthew 4:4</u>). Inherent in them is the Holy Spirit, whose power will strengthen your faith and reshape your heart.

Martin Luther wanted everyone to read the Bible – including children, a radical idea for his time. We too think that no one is too young to participate in Bible reading. In November you should have been mailed two reading plans especially for children. They contain either three verses per day (Level 1) or ten verses each day (Level 2) that can be shared with your family. More copies are available in the church office should you need them.

Luther so valued Bible reading that he himself translated it into German and distributed it widely. When everyone began reading the Bible, it changed the world! It started the Protestant Reformation. So, imagine how Bible reading might revolutionize your own life.

And you don't have to read like Shelby Summerland for it to change you and shape you in amazing and positive ways. Let's gather around God's Word in 2025 - encouraging each other to read it, celebrating making it a habit, and finding joy in what we discover.

Please tell us how much you are reading the Bible!

Reading the Bible will be a group effort at St. Michael this year. Alone, your journey through Scripture might feel like "baby steps," but together, we can scale a mountain! What will you contribute to our combined goal of reading 60,000 Bible chapters in 2025?

Read the entire New Testament and add 260 chapters to the tally. Savor the Psalms and score 150 chapters. If 50 people complete the Bible this

year, we will easily reach our goal.

Haven't you already started counting? It's time to share how many Bible chapters you read in January. There are two ways you can submit that data to the church. Choose a method that works best for you and your family — and please stick with the same means all year.

METHOD #1: The index card system

For those who prefer using pencil and paper, visit the Communications Center to share your Bible reading data. Outside the newly installed door for our soon-to-be relocating church office, you will find a display of wall pocket charts with index cards.

Here's what to do:

Bring the index card mailed to you in November or chose one from a wall pocket.

If using a new card, write your name on the blank (unlined) side.

On the first line of the reverse side, write down the date and the total number of Bible chapters you have read.

Place the index card in a wall pocket with your name visible (facing outward).

As often as you would like, but at least once a month, return to the wall pockets to update your index card.

Record that day's date and the number of Bible chapters you read since the last time you visited the wall pockets.

You might find it easiest to maintain <u>two</u> <u>identical index cards</u>. Keep one at home and switch them out whenever you visit the Communications Center.

When you fill up an index card, start another by repeating steps 1 to 4. Keep all your index cards in the same pocket.

METHOD #2: The online form

You will need to input your name and an email address.

There will be a drop-down menu for you to select the number of Bible chapters you have read *since* <u>the last time</u> you filled out the form.

You can visit the form as often as you like, but please submit your data at least once a month.

At the end of every month, Bible chapters will be calculated and a new total reported to the congregation.

It is so important to let us know how you are doing on your Bible reading journey! Every time you share your progress, we hope it will be a small triumph that motivates you to keep reading.



Look for the opportunity to pick up a Magnetic Bookmark or a marathon reader's Sticker!

Share what your children are reading, too!

You can use options similar to those described above to report how many Bible verses your children are reading. Our goal is for St. Michael's children to read a combined total of <u>26,000 Bible verses</u> by using the Elementary Bible reading plans mailed in November. Paper copies are available still, in the Communication Center.

METHOD #1: In the display area, please write each child's name on a bright-colored index card and follow the same instructions as outlined for adults.

Belize has reported fewer than 90 murders in 2024 for the second consecutive year, marking significant progress since 2005. While gangrelated violence decreased following a mid-year State of Emergency, there was an increase in murders linked to personal disputes and domestic violence. Commissioner of Police Chester Williams commends this improvement but emphasizes the need for justice for grieving families. As we prepare to serve in Belize, we pray for peace and healing for this nation and those affected by violence.


