I was in a meeting the other day and someone asked our school principal if he was sad that the summer was over. He shot back that summer isn't really over until September 21. He's right when it comes to the seasons, but I thought that was a pretty remarkable answer for a school administrator whose students and teachers have already returned to the classroom a week ago. I wouldn't be surprised if some of the teachers are having their students write the proverbial essay entitled "What I Did This Past Summer." While it's always more profitable to look forward than to look backward, reflecting on the past can be special, and even therapeutic, especially if you've grieving a loss of something. As the old saying goes, don't cry that it's over, but smile that it happened.

As most of you probably know, I've been grieving the loss of my mother as of August 13, but actually quite a bit prior to that too, as there's been a grieving process in seeing her health and cognition decline significantly over the entire summer. It all began when she was found on the floor on Memorial Day, and from there she went to the hospital for a week, a rehab facility for a few weeks, and ultimately into a new senior living facility that was willing to care for her (along with hospice help) right up until the end. So my summer was characterized by four trips to Florida and back, a place I had not been to in the summer months since our kids were in school. By the way, there were days when it was just as hot or hotter up here in Michigan as it was down there in Florida.

Much thanks to the many members of our church family who sent us sympathy cards, reached out us with hugs and condolences, and brought us to the Lord in prayer. We're overwhelmed and grateful for your wonderful out powering of love. But now that the summer is over, sort of, we're back at it with a great deal of Kingdom work to be done. Over the summer there has been a lot of remodeling, and moving out and back in, throughout the Christ for Kids (CFK) wing of the building, the place that had been the original sanctuary when St. Michael began over 60 years ago. The preschool has moved out of the school wing altogether now, and a new 6th grade classroom has been created (which also serves as our STEM lab). At the same time, the old storage room and garage on the southeast corner of the property has been transformed into a fun new youth room with a marvelous urban retro look, including a loft and a reclaimed lumber entertainment wall. While there are still finishing touches to be done in the Youth Room, please join us for the CFK ribbon cutting ceremony September 2 at 6:00 pm.

In addition to all the many happenings that occurred this summer, including our rather successful single day VBS on August 2, and our "Mighty Angels" fundraiser golf outing on August 18, a lot of effort this summer has gone into building future plans for expansion accommodate our growing school and childcare center, and a congregational retreat to discuss it on September 27. What's more, at the request of the congregation in a special VA meeting on July 20, we have now formed a very fine Call Committee, under the direction of Rich Conklin. which met for the first time on August 27 and will continue to meet in the weeks and months ahead in an effort to make staffing recommendations for the congregation to consider at the February 2026 Voters' Assembly. Please keep this very important work in your prayers that the "Lord of the Harvest" (Matthew 9:38) would guide us and supply the workers He wants us to have in the years ahead.

So how was your summer? I pray you're smiling that it happened, and excited about what's next for you and for our congregation in this new school year. In addition to worshiping with us each weekend, be sure to get into an Adult Bible class during the 9:45-10:45 Learning Hour as, along with the Sunday School for the children, we'll be providing several of them starting September 7. We're also looking forward to the forty day "Giving Challenge" stewardship emphasis that will begin October 12. Include that in your prayers too, if you would please, and let me know if you would like to help with it.

Planning Moment. St. Michael Lutheran Church maintains a long-range (5 year) plan to guide our church activities and programs. Over the past five years, many of the projects on our 5-year plan have been completed. These projects have helped support our church and school ministries and position our church and school for further growth.

These long-range projects help align and focus church board and committee activities, sometimes with only minor changes to the budgets.

Physical expansions, however, almost always require additional money. And additional time.

It took over 18 months to complete our recent remodeling effort in order to be ready for this year's record school enrollment. The remodeling had a significant impact on many of the areas in our facilities, with little time for planning.

Rather than waiting until our needs are so urgent, we want to start now, identifying those things that will be needed to support our ministry in the future, knowing the priorities, urgency, and costs. We will begin this process next month.

On Saturday, September 27, we will be hosting a Congregational Retreat. We will be asking members of St. Michael for their aspirations, insight, and perspectives for our future. We will then consolidate your insights into our next long-range plan for our Church, Childcare Center, and School programs.

Jesus came to be put to shame, and this happened to Him all throughout His life. He would oftentimes find Himself surrounded by people who would typically be looked shameful. embarrassing, rejected... and He stayed near these people on purpose. He that associating "those people" would not bring Him glory; on the contrary, Jesus was often ridiculed for company that He kept.



Not only would Jesus stay near these people, however, He would do so **instead** of being with those who would have made Him look better. When the Pharisees asked and even mocked Jesus for His behavior, Jesus answered by healing these rejects, forgiving their sins, and telling the Pharisees to humble themselves. Jesus loves those who are rejected, and this ultimately leads to Jesus Himself being rejected and killed.

Jesus takes on our shame, and gives us His glory instead. And this is what we celebrate every week in worship as we gather in His name. Our sins are forgiven, and we are given grace upon grace. Jesus takes away our shame and gives us His glory by sealing us in His name and giving us His body and His blood to eat and to drink.

This is what true glory looks like – living as God's beloved, forgiving, and merciful people. Contrary to how our sinful human nature would perceive glory, we know that true glory comes from trusting in the Lord and in His mighty power. We worship our loving God who takes away our shame and will one day raise us in glory to live with Him forever. Let us glorify God both during weekend worship and during the rest of the week by living in His newly given glory, even as we forgive, serve, and love one another.


"Exploring Our Faith"




SERVICE

This morning myself, Zach, Hanna, Julienne and Joy met at the airport at 4:15 am to board our first flight from Kalamazoo to Detroit, we then connected from Detroit to Toronto, and then from Toronto to Winnipeg at 3pm Eastern. I can confidently say that today went better than expected. Nobody missed their alarm, all flights were on time, customs let us through, no bags were lost. We got to the hotel right at check in, took a much needed nap, and did our daily devotion at a local shawarma place in Winnipeg. This was our first opportunity to bond, pray and eat as a team. Today's devotion centered around the quote "It's go time". Certainly "it's go time" for our travels, and it's also "go time" for us to bond as a team and support each other. Tomorrow we will make the 8 hour drive to Thompson. Please continue to pray for us. God is working.

Day 4 - August 10, 2025

Today was our first full day in Lac Brochet. We started the day by going to Mass in the

morning and inviting those who were at Mass to assist and attend our upcoming events this week. We then took a tour of the town whilst also hanging up our remaining advertisements and getting perishable groceries for the week. Our devotion today centered around enlightening our hearts. Lunch was graciously prepared by Father



Ravi, whom has been a wonderful host to us so far at our stay in the church rectory. We were able to rid the last of our jet lag and put a strong planning session together for the teen night, taking multiple trips to the school for supplies. During teen night, about 20 kids showed up and they were wonderful. We had coloring, jewelry making, and sports for them. There were plenty of situations to talk with the teens one on one about their personal problems and also times to educate them as a group. One of our group activities that was similar to reverse-charades had the message that you can trust God no matter where you are in life. We also played glow in the dark capture the flag with a message about guarding our faith in Christ. Teen night was a good opportunity for us to practice and iron out any kinks before the storm of children show up tomorrow for VBS.

I've heard that a lot of you are curious about the smoke situation. There is a fire to our southwest and one recently started to our east. Sometimes the air quality is perfect and other days you smell like you were at a campfire. It all depends on the direction that the wind is blowing. We have masks if we need them which do filter out some of the particles and thankfully none of us have any pre-existing conditions that are concerning. So far it has only limited us to decreasing the intensity of our activities outside and we do not expect it to limit us anymore than that.



Day 5 - August 11, 2025

Today we finally had our first day of Vacation Bible School for the children! First we scrambled to get everything prepared and ready in the morning, then we visited the band office in the morning and met their business manager as the chief was out of town. It was quite exciting to see someone doing the same job as myself. Come to find out she also had the same deep theological questions that many of us have... like "Who is Cain's wife?" and "Why is there original sin?" So we ended up getting to the school with only a limited amount of time for setup. Luckily we had no major issues with the technology and were able to show the 37 kids that showed up music videos that line up with our theme of Trusting Jesus which is similar to the theme from my 2022 visit. We performed a skit and showed a video about our day's message which was about Jesus' parable of how the wise man built his house upon the rock. We had three stations of crafts, science and games for group rotation. The children were well behaved today, and we're glad that it wasn't too chaotic for our first day. We are expecting and hope more children show up during the week. The smoke was not a factor today but the wind has shifted from coming out of the north and the average temperature is not expected to get above the mid 50s until after we leave. There weren't many kids outside wanting to play tonight because the weather was poor, so Zach and I were able to spend some time socializing with the teens instead at the pool tournament in their newly built teen center.

Day 6 - August 12, 2025

This morning we woke up an hour earlier to spend extra time to plan. We ran a much smoother program today. About the same amount of kids showed up which is just enough children to have without losing control of the group. Our focus today was on bearing other's burdens and giving the weight of sin to Jesus. We brought heavy backpacks to the gym to simulate the burden. Our teen helpers did a good job today. After school, our ladies held a Women's Bible study while Zach and I played hide and go seek and freeze tag with the kids. The new youth/teen center is right next to the church so we are easily able to hang out there and talk to the older kids after school. We also took a ride to the dump and saw about 10 bears. Michael, a member of LAMP joined us today after school and we talked about what other communities are like.

Day 7 - August 13, 2025

Today we had done our devotion, made our plans in the morning and headed off to the gym to get set up. It turns out the school was locked and we didn't have a key to get in. We called the security guy and he wasn't getting back until the time that our program started. So the minute that we entered the school to set up children were pouring in. Luckily we were

able to overcome the hurdle and engage the kids in music as we were setting up. Time was of the essence, and our volunteers were very helpful again. Just like we teach the kids, we are really trusting in Jesus to get us through the final stretch. After the school, Zach and I ran a men's Bible study while the girls played with the kids outside. Two men showed up and we centered our study around the resurrection of Christ. The men had many theories, cultural stories, and questions that they wanted to talk about. We were happy to share what we know for a couple of hours. After Bible study Zach and I went to the playground to entertain the children.

Day 8 - August 14, 2025

As we are packed and prepare to say our final goodbyes tomorrow, I am excited to sleep in my own bed yet sad that I have to leave the bonds that are just beginning with those around the community. We started our day with morning planning and a devotion. Our energy levels were lower than usual but we were inspired by the fact that it was our last day. Heavy cold December like rains made it difficult to get going but we gave it our all to give the children one last day of Bible school. The weather kept many of the children away. But of the children that were there, we were able to give more personal attention and assistance to, which helped them understand our lessons without much distraction. The usual volunteers came full of energy and stayed to help clean up after. At the conclusion of the school, we had no time to rest. We took inventory, finding things that we could've used for the week, and threw out a trunk sized amount of boxes from previous years. Then it was time for the potluck which we had snacks for but not time to prepare a dish. There was some steak, caribou and baklava and we ran out after everyone had a plate. We then played games in the church with all of the teen volunteers, some children, others in the community, our LAMP supporter Michael and Father Ravi until we got tired. As we plan to say our final goodbyes tomorrow, I am planning for this to be my last message unless something happens that I feel compelled to write during the last two days. Most of the day tomorrow will be cleaning and travel to Winnipeg, and the day thereafter flights back home. See you all in Kalamazoo.
